House Resolution No. 79—Relative to Social Work Month.

1 WHEREAS, March 2018 is recognized nationally as Social
2 Work Month, and this year’s theme is, “Social Workers: Leaders.
3 Advocates. Champions.”; and

4 WHEREAS, The social work profession has its roots in the 1889
5 Chicago settlement house movement led by the “Mother of Social
6 Work,” Jane Addams; and

7 WHEREAS, The primary mission of the social work profession
8 is to enhance and meet the basic needs of all people, with particular
9 attention to the needs of, and empowerment through social action
10 and social justice for, those who are poor, oppressed, and living
11 in poverty; and

12 WHEREAS, Today, there are over 630,000 professional social
13 workers in the United States, over 65,000 of whom are in
14 California; and

15 WHEREAS, There are approximately 8,000 graduate students
16 in the social work pipeline in 23 accredited California State
17 University, University of California, and private programs
18 throughout the state; and

19 WHEREAS, Professional social workers train in an intensive
20 combination of classroom and community experiences focused on
21 individuals, families, and communities in crisis and in need of
22 help; and

23 WHEREAS, Professional social workers provide services across
24 the age spectrum, from prenatal to end of life services; and

1 WHEREAS, Professional social workers serve in diverse
2 settings, including schools, courtrooms, health clinics, hospitals,
3 senior centers, homeless shelters, nursing homes, the military,
4 disaster relief, prisons, corporations, and in political office; and

5 WHEREAS, Professional social workers who have served in
6 Congress include the Honorable Ron Dellums, MSW, the
7 Honorable Barbara Lee, MSW, the Honorable Karen Bass, MSW,
8 and the Honorable Susan Davis, MSW, and professional social
9 workers who have served in the California State Legislature include
10 the Honorable Mary Salas, BSW, the Honorable Patty Berg, B.A.
11 in social work; and the Honorable Mariko Yamada, MSW; and

12 WHEREAS, Professional social workers who have combined
13 their leadership skills and knowledge of community development
14 into distinguished positions include Arturo Rodriguez, MSW,
15 President of the United Farmworkers Organization, and Caitlyn
16 Ryan, LCSW, Director of the Family Acceptance Project; now,
17 therefore, be it

18 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California*, That March
19 2018 is proclaimed Social Work Month in the State of California,
20 and the Assembly commends the California Chapter of the National
21 Association of Social Workers for its role in advancing professional
22 social work and promoting the well-being of the people of
23 California, and also encourages all Californians to take part in
24 March “Social Workers: Leaders. Advocates. Champions.” events
25 throughout California; and be it further

SUMMARY: Proclaims March 2018 as Social Work Month in the State of California and commends the California Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers for its role in advancing professional social work and promoting the well-being of the people of California. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) March 2018 is recognized nationally as Social Work Month and this year's theme is, "Social Workers: Leaders. Advocates. Champions."
- 2) The primary mission of the social work profession is to enhance and meet the basic needs of all people, with particular attention to the needs of, and empowerment through social action and social justice for, those who are poor, oppressed, and living in poverty.
- 3) Currently there are over 630,000 professional social workers in the United States, over 65,000 of whom are in California.
- 4) There are over 8,000 graduate students in the social work pipeline in 23 accredited California State University, University of California, and private programs throughout the state.

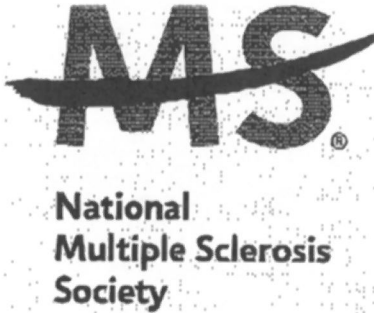

The National Multiple Sclerosis Society is pleased to sponsor HR 82 by Assemblyman Kevin McCarty that declares March 11 – 18, 2018 as Multiple Sclerosis Awareness Week. MS Awareness Week will raise awareness of this debilitating disease throughout California and help educate all residents about the challenges and needs of people living with MS.

Multiple sclerosis is a chronic and often disabling disease of the central nervous system that typically is diagnosed in young adulthood. MS is a puzzling and unpredictable disease that varies widely in its impact, not only from person to person, but also in the same individual at different times. Symptoms range from numbness and tingling to blindness and paralysis. Although the progress, severity and specific symptoms of MS in any one person cannot yet be predicted, advances in research and treatment are moving closer to a world free of MS. Most people with MS are diagnosed in the prime of their lives, between the ages of 20 and 50. More than twice as many women as men are diagnosed with the disease. MS affects more than 40,000 people in California, 400,000 in the U.S. and 2.5 million worldwide.

MS stops people from moving. The goal of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society is to make sure it doesn't in California. HR 82 will enhance knowledge throughout the state about the important issues impacting people living with MS and give a voice to all of those affected by this disease.
