This measure would recognize the month of June 2016 as Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month, would recognize June 21, 2016, as The Longest Day in California, and would urge all residents to wear purple on this day to help spread global awareness of the Alzheimer's Association's vision of imagining a world without Alzheimer's disease.

WHEREAS, Alzheimer's disease, a progressive neurodegenerative brain disorder, tragically robs individuals of their memories and leads to mental and physical impairments; and WHEREAS, California has more residents living with Alzheimer's disease than any other state in the nation and the state's population is projected to grow by 38 percent in the next decade reaching 840,000 individuals affected by 2025; and

WHEREAS, California's Medi-Cal program this year will spend over \$3.3 billion on skilled nursing care and home and community-based supports for beneficiaries living with Alzheimer's disease, quickly climbing to \$5 billion in Medi-Cal spending within 10 years; and

WHEREAS, Alzheimer's disease is always fatal and today it is the fifth leading cause of death in California; and

WHEREAS, Alzheimer's disease is a family disease impacting 1.6 million California spouses, partners, children, siblings, and other relatives who provide unpaid assistance to a loved one; and

WHEREAS, California caregivers devote 1.8 billion hours of unpaid assistance to family members valued at over \$22 billion in nongovernment financial support; and

WHEREAS, On average, a person with Alzheimer's disease lives four to eight years after diagnosis, but can live as long as 20 years, depending on other factors; and

WHEREAS, Individuals living with Alzheimer's disease and their caregivers need acknowledgment, support, and services to meet their needs over the lengthy progression of Alzheimer's disease and related dementias; now, therefor, be it

SUBJECT: Asian and Pacific Islander American Heritage Month

**SUMMARY:** Recognizes May 2016 as Asian and Pacific Islander American Heritage Month. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) Asian and Pacific Islander Americans represent over 15.5 percent of California's population and represent ancestries that include, but are not limited to, Asian Indian, Bangladeshi, Bhutanese, Burmese, Cambodian, Chamorro, Chinese, Taiwanese, Filipino, Hmong, Indonesian, Iu-Mien, Iwo Jiman, Guamanian, Japanese, Korean, Laotian, Malaysian, Maldivian, Mongolian, Nepalese, Native Hawaiian, Vietnamese, Okinawan, Pakistani, Samoan, Singaporean, Sri Lankan, Thai, Tongan, and other Pacific Islander.
- 2) The California Commission on Asian and Pacific Islander American Affairs was established in 2004 and is charged with advising the Governor, the Legislature, and state agencies on issues relating to the social and economic development, rights, and interests of the Asian and Pacific Islander American communities.

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SCR 135, as introduced, Bates. Arthritis Awareness Month.

This measure would proclaim the month of May 2016 as Arthritis Awareness Month.

Fiscal committee: no.

- WHEREAS, Arthritis includes more than 100 rheumatic diseases and conditions that affect joints, tissues that surround joints, and other connective tissue; and
- WHEREAS, Arthritis is a chronic health problem that is the nation's leading cause of physical disability among Americans and is most common among people with multiple chronic conditions; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Arthritis causes pain and loss of movement, can 9 limit everyday activities such as walking and dressing, and can 10 even lead to death; and
- WHEREAS, Arthritis affects an estimated 52.5 million American adults living with some form of doctor-diagnosed arthritis, representing 22.7 percent of adults in the United States; and
- WHEREAS, An estimated 300,000 children under 18 years of age have a form of arthritis or rheumatic condition, representing
- 16 approximately 1 in every 250 children in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Arthritis costs the United States economy more than \$128 billion each year, \$81 billion in direct medical care costs and \$47 billion in indirect costs; and

WHEREAS, In California, arthritis costs our state \$11.5 billion annually; and

WHEREAS, In California there are more than 5.9 million people living with arthritis, including 38,000 children; and

WHEREAS, In California, 43 percent of adults with diabetes also have arthritis, 52 percent of adults with cardiovascular disease also have arthritis, and 38 percent of adults with high blood pressure also have arthritis; and

WHEREAS, Among working age adults with arthritis in California, 43 percent have some work limitations due to their arthritis; and

WHEREAS, An estimated 67 million adults 18 years of age and older will have doctor-diagnosed arthritis by the year 2030; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate of the State of California, the Assembly thereof concurring, That the Legislature understands the extent of, and sympathizes with, the severity of the impact of arthritis on California; and be it further

*Resolved,* That the Legislature recognizes the month of May 2016 as Arthritis Awareness Month and appreciates the efforts of the Arthritis Foundation to seek access to care for all Californians; and be it further

**SUMMARY:** Proclaims the month of May 2016 as Arthritis Awareness Month. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- Arthritis includes more than 100 rheumatic diseases and conditions that affect joints, tissues
  that surround joints and other connective tissue and is the nation's leading cause of physical
  disability among Americans and is most common among people with multiple chronic
  conditions.
- 2) Arthritis affects an estimated 52.5 million American adults living with some form of doctor-diagnosed arthritis, representing 22.7 percent of adults in the United States.
- 3) An estimated 300,000 children under 18 years of age have a form of arthritis or rheumatic condition, representing approximately 1 in every 250 children in the United States.
- 4) In California there are more than 5.9 million people living with arthritis, including 38,000 children which costs our state \$11.5 billion annually.
- 5) Among working adults with arthritis in California, 43 percent have some work limitations due to their arthritis.
- 6) It is estimated that 67 million adults 18 years of age and older will have doctor-diagnosed arthritis by the year 2030.
