Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 132—Relative to West Nile Virus and Mosquito and Vector Control Awareness Week.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 132, as introduced, Eggman. West Nile Virus and Mosquito and Vector Control Awareness Week.

This measure would declare the week of April 20, 2014, through April 26, 2014, as West Nile Virus and Mosquito and Vector Control Awareness Week.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, West Nile virus is a mosquito-borne disease that

2 can result in debilitating cases of meningitis and encephalitis and

3 death to humans, horses, avian species, and other wildlife; and

4 WHEREAS, In 2013, West Nile virus resulted in 14 human

5 deaths in California and over 372 individuals in 31 counties tested

6 positive for the virus, of which over 240 developed neuroinvasive7 disease; and

8 WHEREAS, The State Department of Public Health and the

9 federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention predict West

10 Nile virus will again pose a public health threat in California in

11 2014; and

12 WHEREAS, Adequately funded mosquito and vector control,

13 disease surveillance, and public awareness programs, coupled with

14 best management practices on public and private lands, are the

best ways to prevent outbreaks of West Nile virus and other
 diseases borne by mosquitoes and other vectors; and

3 WHEREAS, Mosquitoes and other vectors, including, but not

4 limited to, ticks, Africanized honeybees, rats, fleas, and flies,

5 continue to be a source of human suffering, illness, and death, and6 a public nuisance in California and around the world; and

WHEREAS, Excess numbers of mosquitoes and other vectors
spread diseases, reduce enjoyment of both public and private
outdoor living spaces, reduce property values, hinder outdoor work,
reduce livestock productivity, and have a negative impact on the

11 environment; and

WHEREAS, Professional mosquito and vector control based
on scientific research has made great advances in safely reducing
mosquito and vector populations and the diseases they transmit;
and

WHEREAS, Established mosquito- and vector-borne diseases such as plague, Lyme disease, flea-borne typhus, and encephalitis, and new and emerging vector-borne diseases such as hantavirus, arenavirus, babesiosis, and ehrlichiosis cause illness and sometimes

20 death every year in California; and

21 WHEREAS, Two invasive mosquito species in California, Aedes 22 albopictus, the Asian tiger mosquito, which was detected in southern California in 2011, and Aedes aegypti, the yellow fever 23 mosquito, which was detected in central and northern California 24 25 in 2013, are posing new public health threats due to their capability 26 to transmit potentially deadly or debilitating diseases, such as 27 dengue, yellow fever, and chikungunya, diseases that are not 28 currently transmitted in California, as well as other 29 encephalitis-causing viruses; and

30 WHEREAS, Mosquito and vector control districts throughout

31 the State of California work closely with the United States

32 Environmental Protection Agency and the State Department of

33 Public Health to reduce pesticide risks to humans, animals, and

34 the environment while protecting human health from mosquito-

35 and vector-borne diseases and nuisance attacks; and

36 WHEREAS, Best management practices, emphasizing 37 nonchemical approaches, have been developed to guide mosquito

37 nonchemical approaches, have been developed to guide mosquito38 control that can significantly reduce mosquito populations for new

39 development and on state and private lands; and

WHEREAS, The State Department of Public Health maintains
 information on how to eliminate risks from vectors at both
 www.cdph.ca.gov and www.westnile.ca.gov, which the public is
 encouraged to review; and

5 WHEREAS, The public's awareness of the health benefits 6 associated with safe, professionally applied mosquito and vector 7 control methods will support these efforts, as well as motivate the 8 state and the public to eliminate mosquito and vector breeding 9 sites on public and private property; and

WHEREAS, Educational programs have been developed to include schools, civic groups, private industry, and government agencies, in order to meet the public's need for information about West Nile virus, other diseases, and mosquito and vector biology and control; and

15 WHEREAS, Public awareness can result in reduced production 16 of mosquitoes and other vectors on residential, commercial, and 17 public lands by responsible parties, avoidance of the bites of 18 mosquitoes and other vectors when the risk of West Nile virus and 19 other disease transmission is high, detection of human cases of mosquito- and vector-borne diseases that may otherwise be 20 21 misdiagnosed for lack of appropriate laboratory testing, and the 22 formation of mosquito or vector control agencies where needed; 23 and

WHEREAS, Public awareness can result in action to provide
adequate funding for existing mosquito and vector control agencies
or to create control agencies in areas where there are no existing
controls; and

28 WHEREAS, West Nile Virus and Mosquito and Vector Control

29 Awareness Week will increase the public's awareness of the threat

30 of West Nile virus and other diseases and the activities of the

various mosquito and vector research and control agencies workingto minimize the health threat within California, and will highlight

34 WHEREAS, The Mosquito and Vector Control Association of

35 California has designated the week of April 20 to April 26, 2014,

AJR 41, as amended, Ian Calderon. Armenian and Assyrian Genocide. This measure would commend the extraordinary service delivered by Near East Relief to the survivors of the Armenian Genocide and the Assyrian Genocide.

WHEREAS, During the Armenian Genocide of 1915 through
 1923, 1.5 million men, women, and children of Armenian descent

3 lost their lives at the hands of the Young Turks regime then ruling

4 the Ottoman Empire in its attempt to systematically eliminate the

6 WHEREAS, In response to the genocide Genocide and at the

7 behest of President Woodrow Wilson and the United States State

8 Department, the Near East Relief organization was founded and

9 was provided unprecedented complete access to all United States

10 Government documents and files concerning the plight of Christian

12 WHEREAS, Near East Relief was the first congressionally

13 sanctioned American philanthropic effort created exclusively to

1 rescue the Armenian nation and other Christian minorities from

2 annihilation after United States Ambassador to Constantinople,

3 Henry A. Morgenthau, Jr., pled for assistance after personally

4 witnessing the systematic massacre of Armenians; and

5 WHEREAS, Near East Relief's efforts resulted in delivering

6 \$117 million of *in* assistance between 1915 and 1930, including

7 the delivery of food, clothing, and materials for shelter, and setting

8 up refugee camps, clinics, hospitals, and orphanages; and

9 WHEREAS, The generous philanthropy of the American people,

10 including many Californians, directly resulted in the salvation of

11 the Armenian and Assyrian refugees and prevented them from

being completely annihilated by the <u>genocide</u> *Genocide* by saving more than one million refugees, including more than 130,000

14 orphans, through their humanitarian assistance; and

15 WHEREAS, Near East Relief evolved into the Near East

Foundation in 1930, and continues to provide humanitarian aid to
people throughout the Middle East and Africa; now, therefore, be

SUBJECT: Armenian and Assyrian Genocide.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: This measure would commend the service delivered by Near East Relief to the survivors of the Armenian Genocide and the Assyrian Genocide. Specifically, <u>this resolution</u> makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) During the Armenian Genocide of 1915 through 1923, 1.5 million men, women, and children of Armenian descent lost their lives at the hands of the Young Turks regime then ruling the Ottoman Empire in its attempt to systematically eliminate the Armenian race.
- 2) In response to the Genocide and at the behest of President Woodrow Wilson and the United States State Department, the Near East Relief organization was founded and was provided unprecedented complete access to all United States Government documents and files concerning the plight of Christian minorities.
- 3) The generous philanthropy of the American people, including many Californians, directly resulted in the salvation of the Armenian and Assyrian refugees. Near East Relief's efforts resulted in delivering \$117 million in assistance between 1915 and 1930, including the delivery of food, clothing, and materials for shelter, and setting up refugee camps, clinics, hospitals, and orphanages.

This bill would recognize the contributions of the Near East Relief organization (currently known as the Near East Foundation) in providing humanitarian assistance to the Christian minorities, including Armenians, which had been subjected to genocide by the Turkish nation from 1915 until 1923.
