House Resolution No. 45—Relative to Animal Rights Awareness Week.

1 WHEREAS, Animals play a significant role in the lives of
2 Californians, from household pets and service animals to livestock
3 and working animals, and their proper care is a reflection of
4 responsible stewardship and community values; and

5 WHEREAS, Humans have a unique role and responsibility in
6 overseeing the well-being of the animals under their care, ensuring
7 that they are treated humanely and not subjected to unnecessary
8 harm or neglect; and

9 WHEREAS, California law has long recognized that the humane
10 treatment of animals is not only a moral responsibility, but one
11 that promotes public health, safety, and social responsibility; and

12 WHEREAS, Animal Rights Awareness Week promotes
13 education on proper animal care, the importance of preventing
14 cruelty, and the value of responsible ownership, particularly for
15 pets and livestock; and

16 WHEREAS, Local animal shelters, nonprofit organizations, and
17 veterinary professionals provide essential services, including
18 rescue, adoption, treatment, and education, and often operate with
19 limited resources; and

20 WHEREAS, Continued investment in animal welfare
21 infrastructure, including appropriate funding for shelters, local
22 enforcement of anticruelty laws, and public education about the

1 importance of spaying and neutering pets, will ensure that animals
2 are properly cared for in every community across the state; and

3 WHEREAS, A culture of stewardship encourages respect for
4 life, accountability among animal owners, and a shared
5 commitment to ethical standards that serve the interests of both
6 people and animals; and

7 WHEREAS, In accordance with the nationally recognized
8 observance of Animal Rights Awareness Week during the third
9 week of June, it is fitting for California to join in raising awareness
10 of the responsibilities we hold toward the animals entrusted to our
11 care; now, therefore, be it

12 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California*, That the
13 Assembly hereby proclaims the week of June 15, 2025, as Animal
14 Rights Awareness Week in the State of California; and be it further

15 *Resolved*, That the Assembly encourages Californians to engage
16 in responsible pet and livestock care, support local efforts that
17 promote humane treatment, and advocate for balanced public
18 policies that strengthen both animal welfare and community
19 well-being; and be it further

20 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
21 of this resolution to animal welfare organizations and local
22 governments as an expression of the Assembly's support for
23 responsible animal stewardship across the state.

SUBJECT: Animal Rights Awareness Week.

SUMMARY: Proclaims the week of June 15, 2025, as Animal Rights Awareness Week in the State of California. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) Animals play a significant role in the lives of Californians, from household pets and service animals to livestock and working animals, and their proper care is a reflection of responsible stewardship and community values.
- 2) Humans have a unique role and responsibility in overseeing the well-being of the animals under their care, ensuring that they are treated humanely and not subjected to unnecessary harm or neglect.
- 3) California law has long recognized that the humane treatment of animals is not only a moral responsibility, but one that promotes public health, safety, and social responsibility.
- 4) Local animal shelters, nonprofit organizations, and veterinary professionals provide essential services, including rescue, adoption, treatment, and education, and often operate with limited resources.
- 5) Continued investment in animal welfare infrastructure, including appropriate funding for shelters, local enforcement of anticruelty laws, and public education about the importance of spaying and neutering pets, will ensure that animals are properly cared for in every community across the state.
- 6) Animal Rights Awareness Week promotes education on proper animal care, the importance of preventing cruelty, and the value of responsible ownership, particularly for pets and livestock.
