1        WHEREAS, The quality of parenting, starting prenatally, is one  
2 of the most powerful predictors of children's future social,  
3 emotional, physical, and behavioral health, and the well-being of  
4 those who are raising children should matter to all of us; and

5        WHEREAS, Families in California incorporate many different  
6 dynamics, including children who are raised by parents,  
7 grandparents, foster parents, family members, and who are  
8 supported by other caregivers in a variety of settings such as  
9 schools, family childcare, early childhood education centers, and  
10 health clinics; and

11       WHEREAS, Today's parents face mounting economic pressures  
12 that directly compete with their ability to provide for their children  
13 and engage in quality parenting; and

14       WHEREAS, Rising housing costs, inflation, and the soaring  
15 price of childcare have forced many caregivers to work longer

1 hours or multiple jobs, leaving less time, energy, and emotional  
2 capacity for nurturing their children. These financial strains,  
3 coupled with the challenges of balancing work, family, and mental

20 WHEREAS, Parenting impacts children's brain development,  
21 neurological regulation, and risk for adverse childhood experiences  
22 (ACEs). Children of Black, indigenous, Latinx, Asian, and other  
23 families of color that already experience inequities rooted in  
24 structural racism are at greater risk for ACE exposure; and

25 WHEREAS, Research echoes the importance of early  
26 intervention, with roughly 30 percent of California caregivers  
27 reporting moderate concerns over their child's social and emotional  
28 development and behavioral health, and 20 to 40 percent of those  
29 same caregivers reporting engaging in some ineffective type of

12 WHEREAS, Anesthesiologists are recognized physician leaders

**LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST**

SCR 106, as introduced, Choi. Korean American Day.

This measure would recognize January 13, 2026, as Korean American Day.

Fiscal committee: no.

1        WHEREAS, On January 13, 1903, the history of Korean  
2    immigration to the United States began when 102 courageous  
3    Korean individuals landed in the State of Hawaii after venturing  
4    across the vast Pacific Ocean aboard the S.S. Gaelic; and

5        WHEREAS, The hopes of these Korean immigrants for America,  
6    the land of opportunity, were quickly hindered by social, economic,  
7    and language barriers of unforeseen magnitude; and

8        WHEREAS, These Korean immigrants did not falter in their  
9    pursuit of the American dream, and through their perseverance  
10   and sacrifice, they established a new home in a new land and  
11   educated their children; and

12      WHEREAS, Between 1904 and 1907, approximately 1,000  
13   Korean Americans entered the United States mainland from the  
14   State of Hawaii through the City and County of San Francisco,  
15   where the first Korean American civic organizations and Korean  
16   language publications were established; and

17      WHEREAS, While the City and County of San Francisco  
18   remained the center of the Korean American community, there

1 was a gradual migration from northern California to southern  
2 California as more employment opportunities opened up, and a  
3 new, burgeoning community of Korean Americans began to thrive  
4 in the City of Los Angeles; and

5 WHEREAS, The City of Los Angeles is currently home to the  
6 largest population of Korean Americans in the United States, with  
7 more than 250,000 Korean Americans, and the neighboring County  
8 of Orange is home to the second largest Korean American  
9 population of any county in the nation; and

10 WHEREAS, While the first Korean immigrants to the United  
11 States fought and sacrificed to establish themselves, their children  
12 grew up to be patriotic citizens, many of whom went on to serve  
13 in the Armed Forces of the United States during World War II and  
14 to make other important contributions to mainstream American  
15 society; and

16 WHEREAS, The 1965 amendments to the federal Immigration  
17 and Nationality Act (Public Law 89-236) opened the door for a  
18 new wave of Korean immigrants to enter the United States. Since  
19 its enactment, Korean Americans have become one of the fastest  
20 growing groups of Asian Americans in the United States, now  
21 numbering more than 2,000,000, representing a more than 79-fold  
22 increase since 1960; and

23 WHEREAS, In 1994, the National Association of Korean  
24 Americans (NAKA) was founded in the State of New York as the  
25 first national civil and human rights organization of Korean  
26 Americans; and

27 WHEREAS, On June 27, 2002, NAKA was instrumental in  
28 passing the historic United States Senate resolution S.R. 185,  
29 recognizing the 100th anniversary of Korean immigration to the  
30 United States; and

31 WHEREAS, In accordance with S.R. 185, President George W.  
32 Bush issued a proclamation recognizing January 13, 2003, as the  
33 Centennial of Korean Immigration to the United States,  
34 commending Korean Americans for their “important role in  
35 building, defending, and sustaining the United States”; and

36 WHEREAS, Korean American Day is celebrated on January  
37 13 of each year to not only commemorate the arrival of the first  
38 Korean immigrants to the United States, but also to honor Korean  
39 Americans’ immense contributions to every aspect of society,  
40 including the important advancements of Californians in the fields

1 of finance, technology, law, medicine, education, sports, media,  
2 the arts, the military, government, and other areas; and

3 WHEREAS, Korean Americans have been at the forefront of  
4 the cultural phenomenon Hallyu (Korean Wave) through K-Pop,  
5 K-Drama, and K-Foods, that have become an integral part of  
6 mainstream American society; and

7 WHEREAS, With diligence, fortitude, and an enduring belief  
8 in the American dream, Korean immigrants have helped to turn

- 5) The City of Los Angeles is currently home to the largest population of Korean Americans in the United States, with more than 250,000 Korean Americans.
- 6) Neighboring County of Orange is home to the second largest Korean American population of any county in the nation.
- 7) Korean Americans have become one of the fastest growing groups of Asian Americans in the United States, now numbering more than two million, representing a more than a 79-fold increase since 1960.
- 8) As the Korean American community prepares for a new era and creates new history, Korean Americans continue to instill in younger generations an appreciation for the courage and values of their forefathers, a deep sense of their roots, and pride in their own cultural heritage so that they may better contribute to the great State of California.
