The Lunar New Year is celebrated on the second new moon following the winter solstice, or the third new moon 6 7 following the winter solstice should an intercalary month intervene; 8 and 9 WHEREAS, California is home to nearly 6,000,000 Asian and Pacific Islander Americans of Bangladeshi, Cambodian, Chinese, 10 Filipino, Hmong, Indian, Indonesian, Iu-Mien, Japanese, Korean, 11 Laotian, Malaysian, Pakistani, Sri Lankan, Taiwanese, and 12 13 Vietnamese descent; and WHEREAS, The Asian and Pacific Islander American 14 communities have greatly contributed to the social, cultural, civic, 15 economic, and academic success of California; and 16 WHEREAS, The Lunar New Year is predominantly celebrated 17 by the 2,500,000 Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, and Iu-Mien 18 19 residents of California; and 20 WHEREAS, The Lunar New Year is universally celebrated by

21 these communities as a time to renew family ties and to start the 22 new year with a clean slate; and

1 WHEREAS, The 2024 Lunar Year is the Year of the Wood 2 Dragon; and

3 WHEREAS, The celebration of the Lunar New Year in 4 communities throughout California illustrates the state's rich 5 cultural history and commitment to racial, religious, and cultural 6 diversity; and

7 WHEREAS, The passing and signing of Assembly Bill 2596

8 of the 2021–22 Regular Session (Chapter 792 of the Statutes of

9 2022) added the Lunar New Year to the list of official California10 state holidays; now, therefore, be it

WHEREAS, In 2015, the United States Advisory Council on

restimated that there were 49,600,000 victims of human trafficking

WHEREAS, According to the ILO, of the total number of global
human trafficking victims, 4,900,000 are women and girls in forced
commercial sexual exploitation; and

WHEREAS, According to the United States Department of
State's 2022 Trafficking in Persons Report, human trafficking
cases have been reported in all 50 states, the District of Columbia,
and United States territories. The United States is among the top
three countries of origin of human trafficking victims; and

18 WHEREAS, In 2021, the National Human Trafficking Hotline 19 stated that there were 1,334 cases of human trafficking documented 20 in California, and in 2021 alone, federal law enforcement initiated 21 more than 1,100 new investigations into human traffickers; and

WHEREAS, The Legislature recognizes the continuously growing crime of human trafficking within California due to its ever-increasing population, extensive international border, large immigrant population, and primary airports and harbors; and

WHEREAS, The State of California is committed to combating
all forms of human trafficking, recovering victims, prosecuting
offenders, advocating on behalf of victims, raising community
awareness, and strengthening collaborative partnerships; and

WHEREAS, National Slavery and Human Trafficking
Prevention Month culminates in the annual observation of National
Freedom Day on February 1, 2024; and

WHEREAS, Founded on the principles of justice and fairness, the United States continues to lead the global movement to end modern slavery, with agencies and skilled professionals at the local, state, and national levels conducting investigations, collaborations, and trainings, organizing public outreach and promoting awareness, and directly assisting the victims of human trafficking; now, therefore, be it
