It is celebrated on the exact day of the astronomical 10 Northward equinox, which occurs on March 19 or the following day where it is observed; and 11

WHEREAS, The "new day" symbolizes a commitment to
springtime renewal, peace, and overall solidarity between
generations, families, and communities; and

15 WHEREAS, Nowrūz's most notable festivities include the creation of the Haft-Sin table, which is an arrangement of seven 16 symbolic items starting with "S" in Persian. WHEREAS, There are over 45,000 professional surveyors in 1 2 the United States, and approximately 4,000 in the State of 3 California; and 4 WHEREAS, Surveying is the art and science of accurately 5 determining the position of points and the distances between them, and is often used to establish land boundaries for ownership or 6 7 governmental purposes; and WHEREAS, Surveying has been an essential element in the 8 9 development of the human environment since the beginning of 10 recorded history and is required in the planning and execution of nearly every form of construction, with its most familiar modern 11 12 uses in the fields of transportation, building and construction, 13 communications, mapping, and the definition of legal boundaries

14 for land ownership; and

WHEREAS, In order to accomplish their objective, surveyors
use elements of engineering, physics, mathematics, law, and
history; and

18 WHEREAS, Since the colonial days of the United States,
19 surveyors have been leaders in the community, statesmen,
20 influential citizens, and shapers of cultural standards; and

21 WHEREAS, Former notable surveyors include George 22 Washington, Thomas Jefferson, Abraham Lincoln, Meriwether

Lewis, William Clark, Daniel Boone, and Henry David Thoreau,among many others; and

1 WHEREAS, It was the work of the surveyor that determined

2 the boundaries of land, the greatest economic asset in the colonies

and territories that became the United States, including California;and

The facts constituting the necessity are: +In order to expedite completion of 200-year flood control projects + protecting life and property in San Joaquin County and West +Sacramento, and to assure a continuing funding stream, and in ++ order to expedite and increase the likelihood of significant federal + financial participation in development of the projects, it is

+ necessary that the bill take effect immediately.

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
