ACR 128, as introduced, Arambula. California Latino and Latina Physician Day.

This measure would designate October 1, 2024, as the first California Latino and Latina Physician Day.

10 accounted for more than two-thirds of the state's population growth

11 during that decade; and

12 WHEREAS, As of 2021, Latinos and Latinas make up almost

13 40 percent of California's population; and

1 WHEREAS, By 2050, Latinos and Latinas will account for more

2 than one in four individuals in the United States and one in three

3 children in the United States; and

4 WHEREAS, Only 6 percent of physicians in the United States 5 are Latino or Latina, and only 7 percent of physicians in California

6 are Latino or Latina; and

7 WHEREAS, Only 2 percent of physicians in the United States8 are Latina; and

9 WHEREAS, The Latino and Latina population faces significant
10 barriers to medical care, including high poverty, fewer facilities
11 in Latino and Latina communities, and language and cultural
12 barriers; and

WHEREAS, A lack of diversity in the medical field leads to worse health outcomes for Latino and Latina patients, including higher rates of chronic disease and maternal mortality; and

#### SUBJECT: California Latino and Latina Physician Day.

**SUMMARY**: Designates October 1, 2024, as the first California Latino and Latina Physician Day, with the goal of increasing the number of Latino and Latina physicians in the State of California and increasing diversity in the medical field. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- The Latino and Latina population faces significant barriers to medical care, including high poverty, fewer facilities in Latino and Latina communities, and language and cultural barriers. A lack of diversity in the medical field leads to worse health outcomes for Latino and Latina patients, including higher rates of chronic disease and maternal mortality.
- 2) The Latino and Latina population in the United States will rise from 42 million individuals in 2005 to 128 million individuals by 2050, and Latinos and Latinas comprise 60 percent of the population growth in the United States.
- 3) Only 6 percent of physicians in the United States are Latino or Latina, and only 7 percent of physicians in California are Latino or Latina. Only 2 percent of physicians in the United States are Latina.
- 4) Research shows that when physicians are of the same ethnicity, culture, and language as the patients of those physicians, care and outcomes improve.
- 5) The first National Latino and Latina Physician Day occurred across the United States on October 1, 2022, and was supported by multiple national organizations and the Latino and Latina community.
- 6) The designation of October 1, 2024, as California Latino and Latina Physician Day will bring awareness to the benefits Latino and Latina physicians bring to the growing Latino and Latina population and the health of the State of California.

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 205, as introduced, Aguiar-Curry. Portuguese Heritage Month: Day of Portugal: Day of the Azores.

This measure would declare the month of June 2024 to be Portuguese Heritage Month and would recognize June 10 as the Day of Portugal and May 20 as the Day of the Azores.

1 WHEREAS, Portuguese presence in California predates the 2 establishment of California as a State in the Union; and

3 WHEREAS. The first Portuguese settlers came to California

4 from the Azores Islands in the early 19th century. Waves of

5 Azorean immigrants moved to California just before and during

6 the 20th century, with the first wave of Azorean immigrants

7 moving to California just before and after the turn of the 20th

8 century, followed by the second and largest wave between 1958

9 and 1976, each contributing substantially to setting up agricultural

operations, especially dairy, livestock, vegetable, fruit farms, andthe tuna industry in southern California; and

WHEREAS, Throughout most of the 20th century, as many asone-half of all Portuguese Californians owned or operated a dairy

1 farm, worked on a dairy farm, or worked in a dairy-related industry.

2 Applying the Portuguese belief in hard work and thriftiness, along

3 with additional labor from family members, Portuguese settlers

could earn enough to reinvest in their businesses, and buy more 4 5

land and cattle. Still today, Portuguese Americans in California 6 continue to play an important role in agriculture and dairying, as

7 proprietors and innovators; and

8 WHEREAS, Historically, California has been a popular destination for immigrants from the Azores Islands, creating strong 9 10 cultural ties between the two regions; currently there are more than 350,000 persons of Portuguese heritage living in California, 11 12 approximately 90 percent of whom have either come directly from 13 the Azores Islands or are of Azorean ancestry; and

14 WHEREAS, In early 1855, the Old Company of Portuguese

15 Whalers, a 15-member enterprise, was owned and operated by

16 Azoreans in the City of Monterey, and, in the City of San Diego,

17 Portuguese immigrants, mostly from the islands of the Azores and 18 Madeira, had a prominent position in the tuna industry; and

WHEREAS, The Portuguese fraternal movement has played a 20 role in the financial and cultural stability of the community, led today by two societies, the Portuguese Fraternal Society of America 21 22 and the Luso-American Fraternal Federation, with headquarters

23 in this state; and

24 WHEREAS, Portuguese language courses taught at community 25 heritage schools, public elementary and high schools, community 26 colleges, the California State University system, University of California campuses, and private colleges build cognizance of the 27 28 importance of the Portuguese language as a world language and 29 awareness to the contributions that Californians of Portuguese 30 ancestry have given this state, as well as building exchanges with 31 colleges and universities in Portugal, including the recently created 32 Portuguese Beyond Borders Institute at the California State 33 University, Fresno, with its new approach to conferences, oral 34 history, research, academic publications, symposiums, exchange 35 programs in agriculture, and community outreach, including the 36 only Azorean Diaspara Center in the CSU system; and

37 WHEREAS, Californians of Portuguese ancestry came together in 2016 to create the California Portuguese American Coalition 38 sponsored by the Luso-American Development Foundation to 39 40 create a network of public servants of Portuguese ancestry and

1 elected officials who represent areas where Californians of

2 Portuguese ancestry live and contribute to our rich diversity and

3 to encourage young Portuguese Americans to participate in our

4 democracy through public service; and

5 WHEREAS, In March of 2018, Californians of Portuguese 6 ancestry created the only strategic plan in the United States to 7 teach the Portuguese language and cultures in California public 8 and private schools, colleges, and universities in order to contribute 9 to the rich linguistic and cultural diversity of our state and to foster 10 a deeper connection to, and increase economic opportunities between, California and all the Portuguese-speaking countries 11 12 throughout the world; and

WHEREAS, The State of California has a sister state relationship
with the Autonomous Region of the Azores, adopted in 2002, and
recently revised by working with a Friends of the Azores group
to bring further development in not only cultural exchanges, but
also in important areas such as renewable energy, sustainable
agriculture, tourism, and technology; and

19 WHEREAS, Among the great Portuguese Americans who have contributed significantly to this country are: composer John Philip 20 Sousa, best known for composing "Stars and Stripes Forever"; 21 22 poet Emma Lazarus, best known for composing a sonnet about the Statue of Liberty, "The New Colossus"; and architect William 23 24 L. Pereira, best known for designing the Transamerica Pyramid 25 in San Francisco. Many Portuguese Americans have also served 26 with distinction in local, state, and federal office, and have served 27 proudly in this country's military; and

WHEREAS, Portuguese Americans have made valuable and
substantial contributions to every facet of California life including
the entertainment industry, the most notable of whom are Mary
Astor, Katy Perry, Tom Hanks, Joe Perry, Nuno Bettencourt, Steve
Perry, and James Franco; and

WHEREAS, The Portuguese community press, through radio, newspaper, and television, have been important vehicles in maintaining the Portuguese American experience in California, serving as bridges to our multicultural state, currently through the Tribuna Portuguesa, the only bilingual Portuguese newspaper in the western United States; and

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 209, as introduced, Kalra. The 2024 International Day of Yoga. This measure would recognize June 21, 2024, as the 2024 International Day of Yoga in California.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, For many years, yoga teachers and students desired a collective global celebration of the over 5,000-year-old physical, 2 3 mental, and spiritual practice of yoga, including yoga teacher Gurudev Sri Sri Ravi Shankar, who explained, "Yoga is a lifestyle 4 5 and should not be mistaken for only asanas." "Yoga helps a human being to unfold his full potential. Yoga improves the quality of 6 7 life, which is so much needed today. Yoga can wipe the tears and 8 bring smiles on every face. It can bring celebration and skill in 9 everyone's life"; and 10 WHEREAS, In 2014, the United Nations General Assembly 11 declared June 21 the International Day of Yoga. During his address to the General Assembly in support of declaring the global 12 celebration, the Prime Minister of India, Narendra Modi, observed, 13 14 "Yoga is an invaluable gift of India's ancient tradition. It embodies

15 unity of mind and body; thought and action; restraint and 16 fulfillment; harmony between man and nature; a holistic approach

1 to health and well-being. It is not about exercise but to discover

2 the sense of oneness with yourself, the world and the nature"; and 3 WHEREAS, The word "yoga" is derived from the Sanskrit word 4 "yuj," which means "to unite or integrate," and one objective of 5 a yoga practice is to harmonize the body, spirit, and mind through 6 various breathing exercises, yoga poses, also called asanas, and 7 meditation. There are four yogas or paths detailed in the Bhagavad 8 Gita: Bhakti yoga (path of devotion); Jnana yoga (path of 9 knowledge); Raja yoga or ashtanga/classical yoga (path involving 10 physical exercises and postures, breathing exercises, concentration, and meditation); and karma yoga (path of selfless and righteous 11 12 action); and 13 WHEREAS, California is home to many yoga teachers, students,

studios, and classes that have collectively contributed to the significant growth of yoga throughout the United States. Yoga has become one of the fastest growing wellness practices in the past decade, with approximately 36,000,000 Americans estimated to practice yoga regularly, and one in three Americans have at least tried yoga once; and

WHEREAS, While yoga originated from Hindu and Vedic traditions, yoga is currently practiced by people of different cultures, traditions, religions, and nationalities, demonstrating that all people have the shared goal to uplift the human experience; and

25 WHEREAS, Yoga brings strength, stability, and unity within the body, mind, and emotions. Recent studies suggest that 26 27 yoga-based interventions can be an effective treatment for various health conditions and mental health disorders and complimentary 28 29 with traditional medical interventions and therapy. A regular practice of yoga may help promote a healthy body, a violence-free society, a clear mind, an open intellect, peacefulness with past experiences, a joyful soul, and a strong breath; and

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 212—Relative to Roadside Assistance Worker Appreciation Week.

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 212, as introduced, Wilson. Roadside Assistance Worker Appreciation Week.

This measure would designate the week of June 23, 2024, to June 29, 2024, inclusive, and every third week of June thereafter, as Roadside Assistance Worker Appreciation Week.

Fiscal committee: no.

- 1 WHEREAS, Roadside assistance crews put their lives on the 2 line every day to help stranded motorists; and
- 3 WHEREAS, The public's health, safety, and well-being are 4 often dependent on the commitment of roadside assistance crews
- 5 to conduct invaluable operations on the side of our roads; and
- 6 WHEREAS, An average of 24 roadside assistance workers are 7 struck and killed by vehicles while working each year; and
- 8 WHEREAS, Every year, roadside assistance workers and first
- 9 responders are struck by passing motorists, often while aiding10 motorists and clearing roadway incidents, causing serious injury
- 11 or death; and
- 12 WHEREAS, Traffic-related incidents are the leading cause of
- 13 death for on-duty law enforcement officers, firefighters, emergency

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1 medical service workers, maintenance workers, and towing 2 professionals; and

3 WHEREAS, Many of these incidents could have been prevented 4 if motorists had followed California's move over law; and

- 3) Traffic-related incidents are the leading cause of death for on-duty law enforcement officers, firefighters, emergency medical service workers, maintenance workers, and towing professionals. Many of these incidents could have been prevented if motorists had followed California's move over law.
- 4) California's move over law requires drivers to move over a lane when approaching a stopped emergency roadside vehicle with flashing amber lights and, if unable to do so safely, requires drivers to slow down.
- 5) Recognizing Roadside Assistance Worker Appreciation Week reinforces public awareness of slow down, move over laws, which mitigate the daily risks encountered by these roadside assistance and service professionals.

Dear Assembly Member Wilson:

It is with great appreciation and pride that the California Tow Truck Association (CTTA) supports your Assembly Concurrent Resolution 212, which will designate the week of June 23 – June 29, 2024, and every third week of June thereafter, as Roadside Assistance Worker Appreciation Week.

CTTA, also known nationally as the Emergency Road Service Coalition of America (ERSCA), is a nonprofit trade association, representing nearly 1,000 emergency roadside responders and towing companies within the State of California and throughout the country. Originally established in 1969 to increase the professionalism in the towing industry and safety of the motoring public, today CTTA offers an extensive driver training program approved by the CHP, which trains over 900 tow operators each year to ensure the best and safest possible service to the motoring public. CTTA is the largest towing-based association in the world.

Sadly, operating a tow truck remains one of the most dangerous professions in the country with an extremely high risk of fatality. National data from 2011-2016 complied by the National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health (NIOSH) demonstrated that tow truck operators were 15 times more likely to be killed in the line of duty than workers in other U.S. private industries and twice as likely to get injured<sup>1</sup>. Further, each year the Emergency Responder Safety Institute (ERSI), an informal advisory panel of public safety leaders from across the

country committed to reducing deaths and injuries to America's emergency responders, compiles and releases a report on the number of emergency responders that were killed working on roadways across the country. In its 2023 report, of the 45 emergency responders that were struck and killed by vehicles while working on roadways in 2023, 20 of these fatalities were tow truck operators, which accounts for approximately 44% of the total fatalities that year. 3 of these 2023 tow operator fatalities occurred in California.<sup>2</sup>

In addition to comprehensive tow operator training, California's Move Over law – Vehicle Code section 21809, which requires drivers to move over a lane, if safe to do so, or slow down, when passing vehicles with flashing amber lights – is a critical tool for protecting roadway workers, law enforcement officers, fire fighters, tow truck operators and other first responders stopped on our roads.

Unfortunately, far too few drivers are aware of the state's Move Over law, and many of these tragic incidents involving roadside assistance workers could have been prevented if motorists had simply slowed down and moved over.

ACR 212 will save lives by raising awareness of the dangers involved when roadside assistance workers are providing critical services to those in need on our roads and the importance of abiding by the Move Over law.

CTTA stands with you and our fellow roadside assistance workers to ensure this crucial measure enacting Roadside Assistance Worker Appreciation Week is passed, so that the crews that put their lives on the line every day to help stranded motorists are appreciated and safe. CTTA will continue to push for awareness to the motoring public until there are no more lives needlessly lost on our roadways.

# SENATE VOTE: 32-0

SUBJECT: California Aerospace Day.

**SUMMARY**: Proclaims the day of June 5, 2024, as California Aerospace Day, in recognition of the contributions of the aerospace, aviation, and defense industries to the history, economy, security, and educational system of California, its communities, and its citizens. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- The California aerospace industry leads the United States in aerospace and defense services, including the design and manufacture of aircraft, spacecraft, and commercial satellites, as well as a myriad of systems and instruments for search, detection, navigation, guidance, and radio and television broadcast and wireless communication systems.
- 2) California is home to many superb sites of air and space activity, including Vandenberg Space Force Base, Los Angeles Air Force Base, Edwards Air Force Base, Naval Base Ventura County, Naval Air Weapons Station China Lake, the Mojave Air and Space Port, more than 20 astronomical observatories, multiple international airports, many important defense aerospace bases, and hundreds of business and general aviation airfields.
- 3) California is also home to three National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) research and engineering centers, which are recognized as the Ames Research Center; the NASA Neil A. Armstrong Flight Research Center, formerly known as the Dryden Flight Research Center; and the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory (JPL).
- 4) The California aerospace and defense industry supports \$100 billion in annual economic activity and provides California with considerable economic and employment impacts of 511,000 high-paying jobs, which make up 39 percent of all state manufacturing jobs.
- 5) California's aerospace and defense industry is committed to continuing to lead the way on environmental stewardship, capitalizing on the innovation at the core of the aerospace and defense industry towards identifying and achieving ambitious sustainability goals.
- 6) California can continue being at the forefront of advancements in aviation through transformative aviation solutions using electric, hydrogen, and hybrid propulsion systems for urban and regional air mobility expected to be in commercial operation by 2025.
