Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 103—Relative to California Physical Education Week.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SCR 103, as introduced, Fuller. California Physical Education Week. This measure would declare May 1, 2018, to May 7, 2018, inclusive, as California Physical Education Week, to coincide with National Physical Education and Sport Week, in an effort to promote high-quality physical education instruction for all pupils in California. The measure also would encourage teachers, school policymakers, and school leaders to provide the highest quality physical education instruction in their schools for all pupils and provide that the week serve as an opportunity for those persons to collaboratively review current instructional practices in physical education and make needed recommendations.

1 WHEREAS, Physical education is an academic discipline that

2 equips our pupils with the knowledge, skills, and dispositions they

3 need to build and protect their physical, mental, and social health;

5 WHEREAS, Physical activity is essential to virtually every facet

7 citizens, including improved health, longer life, higher academic8 achievement, improved mental health, and improved quality of

9 life; and

10 WHEREAS, Substantial evidence shows that California's 11 children and young people are less active now than ever, and the

1 impact of physical education instructional programs is key in

3 to their dispositions for physical activity at all stages of their lives;

5 WHEREAS, High-quality instruction in physical education also 6 makes significant contributions to state educational priorities, 7 including literacy development, social-emotional learning, school 8 culture, STEM (science, technology, engineering, and 9 mathematics), technology, and other priorities; and

WHEREAS, Physical education is an integral part of a well-rounded education in California and across the nation with its inclusion in the federal Every Student Succeeds Act, contributes to college and career readiness, and leads to productive, healthy,

15 WHEREAS, The State Board of Education adopted both the16 Physical Education Model Content Standards for California Public

17 Schools: Kindergarten Through Grade Twelve and the Physical

18 Education Framework for California Public Schools: Kindergarten

19 Through Grade Twelve to communicate what our pupils should

20 know and be able to do at each grade level, and to provide guidance

21 for our school leaders and teachers to take the necessary steps in

implementing high-quality physical education programs for allpupils; and

SUMMARY: Declares May 1, 2018, to May 7, 2018, inclusive as California Physical Education Week, to coincide with National Physical Education and Sport Week, in an effort to promote high-quality physical education instruction for all pupils in California. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) Physical education is an academic discipline that equips our pupils with the knowledge, skills, and dispositions they need to build and protect their physical, mental, and social health.
- 2) Physical activity is essential to virtually every facet of life in California, and makes significant contributions to all our citizens, including improved health, longer life, higher academic achievement, improved mental health, and improved quality of life.
- 3) Substantial evidence shows that California's children and young people are less active now than ever, and the impact of physical education instructional programs is key in building their skills, advancing their knowledge, and contributing to their dispositions for physical activity at all stages of their lives.
- 4) Physical education is an integral part of a well-rounded education in California and across the nation with its inclusion in the federal Every Student Succeeds Act, contributes to college and career readiness, and leads to productive, healthy, adult lives.
- 5) The State Board of Education adopted both the Physical Education Model Content Standards for California Public Schools: Kindergarten Through Grade Twelve and the Physical Education Framework for California Public Schools: Kindergarten Through Grade Twelve to communicate what our pupils should know and be able to do at each grade level, and to provide guidance for our school leaders and teachers to take the necessary steps in implementing high-quality physical education programs for all pupils.
- 6) High-quality physical education programs provide each of our pupils with the opportunity to learn, to have their skills and knowledge evaluated, and to build value for including physical activity into their lives each day; and, this instruction is built on sound policies, delivered by appropriately credentialed teachers, and focuses on pupil success in learning.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SCR 119, as introduced, Jackson. May 2018: California YMCA Safety Around Water Month.

This measure would observe May 2018 as California YMCA Safety Around Water Month.

1 WHEREAS, According to the Centers for Disease Control and

2 Prevention, drowning is the leading cause of accidental death for

3 children zero to four years of age, inclusive; and

4 WHEREAS, According to the Centers for Disease Control and

5 Prevention, drowning is the second-leading cause of accidental

6 death for children five to 14 years of age, inclusive; and

7 WHEREAS, In the United States, two children drown every 8 day; and

9 WHEREAS, Eighty-eight percent of all child drowning incidents10 occur when an adult is present; and

11 WHEREAS, Ninety percent of all child drowning incidents

12 occur within 30 feet of safety and 60 percent occur within 10 feet13 of safety; and

14 WHEREAS, In 2013, in California, there were 60 drowning 15 fatalities and 804 immersion-related emergency visits and

16 hospitalizations for children zero to four years of age, inclusive;

17 and

1 WHEREAS, In 2013, in California, there were 25 drowning 2 fatalities and 207 immersion-related emergency visits and 3 hospitalizations for children five to 17 years of age, inclusive; and WHEREAS, The Young Men's Christian Association ("YMCA" 4 or "the Y") teaches one million children to swim each year in the 5 6 United States and has been California's leading swim instruction 7 resource for over 100 years; and 8 WHEREAS, The Y offers an evidence-based water safety

program for children and families called "Safety Around Water,"
which teaches young children and their caregivers life-saving water
skills ("Swim, Float, Swim" and "Jump, Push, Turn, Grab") and
knowledge to prevent drowning and encourages participation in
aquatics as a healthy fitness and recreational activity; and

WHEREAS, The California State Alliance of YMCAs has a statewide commitment to reducing childhood drowning through

16 the Safety Around Water program; and

WHEREAS, The YMCAs in California offering the SafetyAround Water program do so at no charge to participants; and

WHEREAS, The month of May of each year is recognized asNational Drowning Prevention Month; now, therefore, be it

SUMMARY: Observes May 2018 as California YMCA Safety Around Water Month. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, drowning is the leading cause of accidental death for children zero to four years of age, inclusive, and the second-leading cause of accidental death for children five to 14 years of age, inclusive.
- 2) In the United States, two children drown every day. Eighty-eight percent of all child drowning incidents occur when an adult is present, and ninety percent of all child drowning incidents occur within 30 feet of safety and 60 percent occur within 10 feet of safety.
- 3) In 2013, in California, there were 60 drowning fatalities and 804 immersion-related emergency visits and hospitalizations for children zero to four years of age, and there were 25 drowning fatalities and 207 immersion-related emergency visits and hospitalizations for children five to 17 years of age.
- 4) The Young Men's Christian Association ("YMCA" or "the Y") teaches one million children to swim each year in the United States and has been California's leading swim instruction resource for over 100 years. The California State Alliance of YMCAs has a statewide commitment to reducing childhood drowning through the Safety Around Water program.
