This measure would proclaim the week of February 25, 2019, to March 3, 2019, inclusive, as Eating Disorders Awareness Week.

- 1 WHEREAS, The 2019 theme of National Eating Disorders
2 Awareness Week is “Come As You Are,” and will focus on
3 inclusivity in the greater eating disorder community and unifying
4 the field of eating disorders. Eating disorders are shrouded in
5 stigma, secrecy, and stereotypes, and the goal of this year’s
6 campaign is to send a message to individuals at all stages of body
7 acceptance and eating disorder recovery that their stories are valid;

9 WHEREAS, Eating disorders are serious conditions that are
10 potentially life threatening and have a great impact on both a
11 person's physical and emotional health. Too often, signs and
12 symptoms are overlooked, and many individuals, families, and
13 communities are unaware of the devastating mental and physical

1 consequences of eating disorders, as well as the pressures, attitudes,
2 and behaviors that shape them; and

3 WHEREAS, In the United States, 20 million women and 10
4 million men suffer from clinically significant eating disorders at
5 some time in their life. These disorders affect people across all
6 backgrounds and include anorexia nervosa, bulimia nervosa, and
7 binge eating disorders; and

8 WHEREAS, The National Eating Disorders Association strives
9 to address the many misconceptions regarding eating disorders,
10 and to highlight the availability of resources for treatment and
11 support; and

12 WHEREAS, National Eating Disorders Awareness Week is a
13 collaborative effort consisting primarily of volunteers, including
14 eating disorder professionals, health care providers, students,
15 educators, social workers, and individuals committed to raising
16 awareness of the dangers surrounding eating disorders and the
17 need for early intervention and treatment access; and

18 WHEREAS, Eating disorders usually appear in adolescence and
19 are associated with substantial psychological problems, including
20 depression, substance abuse, and suicide. Eating disorders are
21 serious illnesses, not lifestyle choices. In fact, anorexia has the
22 highest mortality rate of any mental illness; and

23 WHEREAS, Many cases of eating disorders go undetected, and
24 less than one-third of youth with eating disorders will receive
25 treatment; and

26 WHEREAS, Eating disorder experts have found that prompt
27 intensive treatment significantly improves the chances of recovery.
28 Therefore, it is important for educators, medical providers, parents,
29 and community members to be aware of the warning signs and the
30 symptoms of eating disorders; and

31 WHEREAS, National Eating Disorders Awareness Week will
32 encourage people to share their stories and experiences with eating
33 disorders and body image struggles, highlight the importance of
34 screening for the early detection and intervention of eating
35 disorders, and bust myths and present eating disorders as a public
36 health issue that affects all kinds of people, regardless of age,
37 gender, ethnicity, size, or background; and
