LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

ACR 157, as amended, Waldron. California Arbor Day.

This measure would ~~proclaim April 24, 2020, as~~ *recognize March 7, 2020, as* California Arbor Day, and would urge California residents to observe the day with appropriate tree-planting activities and programs.

- 1 WHEREAS, In 1872, J. Sterling Morton successfully proposed
- 2 to the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture the first tree-planting
- 3 holiday, which was to be called “Arbor Day”; and
- 4 WHEREAS, This holiday, which has spread throughout the
- 5 United States and is observed in many countries around the world,
- 6 was first commemorated with the planting of more than 1,000,000
- 7 trees in the State of Nebraska; and
- 8 WHEREAS, The purpose of Arbor Day is to encourage people
- 9 to plant trees, and many communities organize tree-planting and
- 10 litter-collecting events on or around the holiday; and
- 11 WHEREAS, *The Legislature proclaimed the first California*
- 12 *Arbor Day on March 7, 1974; and*

1 WHEREAS, In California, trees are a valuable economic asset
2 that helps to maintain and increase property values and to attract
3 businesses and new residents to urban areas; and

4 WHEREAS, Trees promote energy conservation by providing
5 shade and increasing humidity, which moderates temperature
6 extremes, and reducing the energy necessary to heat and cool
7 buildings and homes; and

8 WHEREAS, Trees planted in urban areas reduce the emissions
9 of greenhouse gases, consistent with the state's statutory targets,
10 by reducing energy consumption, and sequester carbon; and

11 WHEREAS, Trees improve California's air quality by reducing
12 air pollution, removing airborne particulate matter from the
13 atmosphere, and purifying the air; and

14 WHEREAS, Trees protect and purify California's limited water
15 resources by reducing surface runoff, contributing to stormwater
16 management activity, and protecting urban water resources; and

17 WHEREAS, Trees provide essential habitat for much of
18 California's wildlife, including many listed, threatened, and

31 underserved and severely underserved communities, and of urban

SUMMARY: Recognizes March 7, 2020, as California Arbor Day and urges California residents to observe the day with appropriate tree-planting activities and programs. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) The Legislature proclaimed the first California Arbor Day on March 7, 1974; and, the purpose of Arbor Day is to encourage people to plant trees, and many communities organize tree-planting and litter-collecting events on or around the holiday.
- 2) In California, trees are a valuable economic asset that helps to maintain and increase property values and to attract businesses and new residents to urban areas.
- 3) Trees promote energy conservation by providing shade and increasing humidity, which moderates temperature extremes, and reducing the energy necessary to heat and cool buildings and homes.
- 4) Trees planted in urban areas reduce the emissions of greenhouse gases, consistent with the state's statutory targets, by reducing energy consumption, and sequester carbon; and they improve air quality by reducing air pollution, removing airborne particulate matter from the atmosphere, and purifying the air.

- 7) Maximizing the benefits of trees through multiple-objective projects that contribute to public infrastructure services can provide cost-effective solutions to the needs of underserved and severely underserved communities, and of urban and suburban areas, by harnessing the aforementioned benefits provided by trees.

1 WHEREAS, The continuous progress of our economy requires
2 full participation and support of all citizens, regardless of gender,
3 race, or ethnic background; and

4 WHEREAS, The workforce in California is becoming
5 increasingly diversified and for this state's construction industry
6 to remain competitive in the global economy, it must also diversify
7 its workforce by attracting significantly more women into the
8 industry; and

9 WHEREAS, Women currently occupy only 10 percent of all
10 apprenticeships and less than 3 percent of construction trade jobs

35 enterprises will benefit all members of the workforce through the
36 creation of meaningful and productive jobs; and

37 WHEREAS, Research has shown that gender diversity is
38 associated with increased performance, innovation, and
39 opportunity. Having more women entrepreneurs and small business

1 owners operating in the construction industry will only benefit the
2 working conditions for women across all industries; and

3 WHEREAS, Women represent an untapped resource, and
4 activities to improve women's recruitment and retention in skilled
5 construction jobs is critically important in helping to close the
6 workforce skills gap, build the middle class, and help meet the
7 needs of the 21st century; now, therefore, be it

Dear Assembly Member Ken Cooley,

On behalf of the Sacramento Regional Builders Exchange, representing nearly 1,200 construction member companies, we are pleased to sponsor and express our strong support for Assembly Concurrent Resolution (ACR) 169, which seeks to recognize women's invaluable contributions to California's construction industry and encourage lawmakers to support policies that educate, inspire and advance women who are building careers in construction.

As you know, women face severe underrepresentation in construction, engineering and manufacturing, with just an 8.9 percent share of the total U.S. construction industry alone. Only 1.3 percent of operating engineers and construction equipment operators are women, making these occupations the tenth most male-dominated in the country.

Like many industries who are struggling to close the skilled labor gap, the construction industry has been especially hit hard by the last economic downturn when tens of thousands of construction workers left the state or industry. Today, for every five (5) construction workers who are preparing for retirement, there is only one (1) to in the pipeline to replace them. ACR 169 recognizes women as an untapped resource to help close this skilled labor gap so that California can continue to keep pace with infrastructural needs.

Simply put, ACR 169 helps to better position California to increase women's participation in high-wage, high-skill nontraditional fields, such as construction, is vital to economic prosperity and security.

For these reasons, we want to thank you for introducing ACR 169 and will encourage your legislative colleagues to support this measure on the Assembly Floor.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 170—Relative to Arts Education Month.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

ACR 170, as introduced, Kamlager. Arts Education Month.

This measure would proclaim March 2020 as Arts Education Month and would urge all residents to become interested in and give full support to quality school arts programs for children and youth.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, Arts education, which includes dance, music,
2 theater, and the visual arts, is an essential and integral part of basic
3 education for all pupils in prekindergarten, kindergarten, and grades
4 1 to 12, inclusive; and

5 WHEREAS, The arts are crucial to achieving a state educational
6 policy that is devoted to the teaching of basic academic skills and
7 lifelong learning capacities with the goal of truly preparing all
8 children for success after high school regardless of gender, age,
9 economic status, physical ability, or learning ability; and

10 WHEREAS, A systematic, substantive, and sequential visual
11 and performing arts curriculum addresses and develops ways of
12 thinking, questioning, expression, and learning that complement
13 learning in other core subjects, but that is unique in what it has to
14 offer; and

1 WHEREAS, Pupils benefit from arts learning in the areas of
2 cultural understanding, readiness for learning and creative thinking,
3 cognitive outcomes, emotional intelligence and expression, social
4 interaction and collaboration, and preparation for the workplace
5 and lifelong learning; and

6 WHEREAS, Arts education in California is mandated for pupils
7 in grades 1 to 12, inclusive, by Sections 51210 and 51220 of the
8 Education Code, which provide, in part, “[t]he adopted course of
9 study ... shall include instruction ... in ... [v]isual and performing
10 arts, including instruction in the subjects of dance, music, theatre,
11 and visual arts, aimed at the development of aesthetic appreciation
12 and the skills of creative expression”; and

13 WHEREAS, The arts are recognized as part of a quality
14 education, and the University of California and the California State
15 University have instituted a policy that includes visual and
16 performing arts as a college preparatory subject for all high school
17 pupils wishing to enter the state’s institutions of higher education;
18 and

19 WHEREAS, The State of California, through the local control
20 funding formula, has provided flexibility for local educational
21 agencies to target growing resources towards arts education; and

22 WHEREAS, It is the intent of the Legislature that this funding
23 help implement a comprehensive vision for arts education at the
24 local level to ensure that every pupil in the state benefits from this
25 investment; and

26 WHEREAS, This funding is the first step in investing in quality
27 visual and performing arts programs for all California pupils; and

28 WHEREAS, Many national and state professional arts education
29 associations hold celebrations in the month of March, giving
30 California schools a unique opportunity to focus on the value of
31 the arts for all pupils, foster cross-cultural understanding, give
32 recognition to the state’s outstanding young artists, and enhance
33 public support for this essential part of the curriculum; and

34 WHEREAS, The visual and performing arts have a unique
35 ability to communicate the ideas and emotions of the human spirit
36 and connect us to our history, heritage, and culture. They foster
37 creativity, critical thinking, and collaborative skills. Beyond the
38 classroom, the arts engender humanity and citizenship, which
39 contribute to the vitality of communities and enrichment of the
40 larger world. Every student has a right to a well-rounded education

- 3) More than 58 percent of California public school pupils qualify for free or reduced-price school meals, yet many of those low-income pupils are not eating the nutritious school breakfast offered due to barriers such as social stigma, late buses or carpools, long cafeteria lines, and tight class schedules.
- 4) Eating breakfast as part of the school day is associated with a positive pupil behavioral health and academic performances, such as better test scores, improved concentration in class, lower rates of chronic absenteeism, fewer classroom disruptions, and less frequent visits to the school nurse. School breakfast participation is also associated with a lower body mass index, which is an indicator of sustainable body fat, lower probability of being overweight, and lower probability of obesity.
- 5) Breakfast After the Bell programs, such as breakfast in the classroom, grab and go breakfast, and second chance breakfast, are proven meal delivery methods that boost school breakfast participation and related positive outcomes.
- 6) States across the nation have introduced legislation to require that schools with a high percentage of pupils who are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals implement a Breakfast After the Bell program.
- 7) If California schools increased school breakfast participation such that 70 percent of the pupils who eat free or reduced-price lunch also participated in their school's breakfast program, an additional 335,160 pupils would receive breakfast every day and school districts would receive an additional \$100 million in federal meal reimbursements for their school nutrition budgets.


