- 2) Engineers Week is celebrating its 69th anniversary with the theme, Engineers: Pioneers of Progress, to promote recognition among parents, teachers, and students of the importance of a technical education and a high level of mathematics, science, and technology literacy; and, to motivate youth to pursue engineering careers and participate in a diverse and vigorous engineering workforce.
- 3) California leads the world in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM) education, inspiring and preparing all of its students to seize the opportunities of the global society through innovation, inquiry, collaboration, and creative problem solving.
- 4) According to the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, there are more than 1.7 million practicing engineers in the United States, and according to the Board for Professional Engineers, Land Surveyors, and Geologists, there are over 90,000 active, licensed engineers in the State of California.

Resolved by the Senate of the State of California, the Assembly thereof concurring, That the first Wednesday in February be declared California Girls and Women in Sports Day to acknowledge the contributions of, and to recognize, girls and women in sports in California; and be it further

Resolved, That all teachers, school administrators, and community policymakers take appropriate measures to ensure equity in sports programs and activities in California; and be it further

Dear Chair Cooley:

The California Association for Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance (CAHPERD) is a non-profit and diverse group whose mission is the "passionate promotion of active, healthy lifestyles." Members take a strong stand for quality programs in Health, Physical Education, Recreation, Sport and Dance, and other movement-related activities vital to the residents of California.

CAHPERD is proud to recognize and sponsor the 34th National Girls and Women in Sports Day on February 5, 2020. Further, the Association is in full support of equal opportunities that sport can provide for Girls and Women in Sports (GWS). Although there have been tremendous strides for females in sports since the landmark passage of Title IX in 1972, CAHPERD strongly believes there is more work to be completed, and there is more equality that can be accomplished. We feel this endeavor must be achieved through education and advocacy.

The wealth of positive benefits for girls' and women's participation in sports is multi-faceted and includes psychological physiological, emotional, and sociological areas [Women's Sports Foundation — Executive Summary 2020 (WSF)]. Since Title IX, research has consistently found females' participation in sport has been associated with lower body mass index (BMI) and lower rates of obesity (Kaestner and Xu, 2010). Further, these findings correlate to higher rates of self-worth reported by females who participate in sports in their adolescent years (Collins, Cromartie, Butler, and Bae, 2018). Moreover, research has consistently supported that females' participation in sports leads to more effective

coping skills to deal with the pressures of everyday life demands and leads to greater psychosocial development.

CAHPERD understands that Title IX laid the foundation for females of all ages to participate in sport. WSF also <u>states</u> that only 40% of teen girls are not actively participating in sports. We will continue to lend assistance in any form for the promotion and equality for GWS. Therefore, CAHPERD embraces February 5th 2020 as National Women in Sports Day and *California Girls and Women in Sports Day*.
