No. 3

Introduced by Assembly Member Choi

December 7, 2016

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 3—Relative to
Korean-American Day.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 3, as introduced, Choi. Korean-American Day.

This measure would proclaim January 13, 2017, and January 13, 2018, as Korean-American Day.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, On January 13, 1903, the history of Korean
2 immigration to America began when 102 courageous Korean men,
3 women, and children landed in Hawaii after venturing across the
4 vast Pacific Ocean aboard the S.S. Gaelic; and

5 WHEREAS, The hopes of these Korean immigrants for America,
6 the land of opportunity, were quickly hindered by social, economic,
7 and language barriers of unforeseen magnitude; and

8 WHEREAS, These Korean immigrants did not falter in their
9 pursuit of the American dream. Through tenacious effort and
10 sacrifice, they established a new home in a new land and educated
11 their Korean-American children; and

12 WHEREAS, Between 1904 and 1907, approximately 1,000
13 Korean Americans entered the United States mainland from Hawaii
14 through San Francisco, where the first Korean-American political
15 organizations and Korean-language publications were established;
16 and

1 WHEREAS, Many Korean Americans left San Francisco,
2 primarily to become farmworkers. Some Korean Americans
3 combined their money and resources to lease farmland near the
4 towns of Dinuba and Reedley in the San Joaquin Valley and in the
5 Sacramento Valley. Dozens of other Korean Americans served as
6 wage laborers for mining companies and as section hands on the
7 railroads in Montana, Oregon, Utah, and Washington; and

8 WHEREAS, The Japanese occupation of Korea prevented
9 further Korean immigration into the United States. However, many
10 Korean Americans desired to establish families in the United States,
11 despite the new limitations on immigration. As a result, a picture
12 bride system was established, which delivered approximately 1,000
13 new Korean immigrants to Hawaii, and 100 more to the Pacific
14 Coast of the United States mainland, before 1924; and

15 WHEREAS, San Francisco remained the center of the
16 Korean-American community during this period, but there was a
17 gradual migration of Korean Americans from San Francisco and
18 the surrounding rural areas to southern California. As more
19 employment opportunities opened up, a new, burgeoning
20 community of Korean Americans began to thrive in the Los
21 Angeles area; and

22 WHEREAS, While the first Korean immigrants to the United
23 States fought and sacrificed to establish themselves, their children
24 grew up to be patriotic citizens, many of whom went on to serve
25 in the Armed Forces of the United States during World War II and
26 to make other important contributions to mainstream American
27 society; and

28 WHEREAS, The 1965 amendments to the federal Immigration
29 and Nationality Act (Public Law 89-236) opened the door for a
30 new wave of Korean immigrants to enter the United States. Since
31 its enactment, Korean Americans have become one of the fastest
32 growing groups of Asian Americans in the United States. In 1960,
33 approximately 25,000 people of Korean ancestry lived in the United
34 States, but by 1970, that number had increased to 69,130. By 1980,
35 the number of people of Korean ancestry living in the United States
36 had increased over fivefold to 354,593, and by 1990, that number
37 more than doubled, increasing to 798,849. In 2007, it was estimated
38 that 1,555,293 people with some Korean ancestry lived in the
39 United States, representing more than a sixtyfold increase since
40 1960; and

1 WHEREAS, With diligence, fortitude, and an enduring belief
2 in the American dream, Korean immigrants have helped to turn
3 emergent areas within the State of California into thriving and
4 respectable communities, while raising their children to be
5 productive Korean Americans; and

6 WHEREAS, Korean Americans have become an integral part
7 of mainstream American society and have made important
8 contributions as Californians in the fields of finance, technology,
9 law, medicine, education, sports, media, the arts, the military, and
10 government, as well as other areas; and

11 WHEREAS, As the Korean-American community prepares for
12 a new era and creates new history, Korean Americans must instill
13 in younger generations the proper appreciation for the courage and
14 values of their forefathers, a deep sense of their roots, and pride
15 in their own cultural heritage so that they may better contribute to
16 the great State of California, rich with ethnic and cultural diversity;
17 now, therefore, be it

18 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
19 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature hereby proclaims January
20 13, 2017, and January 13, 2018, as Korean-American Day; and be
21 it further

22 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
23 of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 5—Relative to Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 5, as introduced, Holden. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

This measure would designate that January 16, 2017, be observed as the official memorial of the late Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birth and commemorate Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and the work of Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement in changing public policy in California and in the United States of America.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, One hundred years after the Emancipation
2 Proclamation, on August 28, 1963, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.
3 and others organized hundreds of thousands of blacks and whites,
4 Jews and gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, in a march to the
5 Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C. where Dr. King made his
6 famous "I Have a Dream" speech announcing that the days of
7 segregation in the United States were numbered; and
8 WHEREAS, Monday, January 16, 2017, marks the 31st National
9 Celebration of the National Holiday for Dr. Martin Luther King,
10 Jr. and his fight for civil and human rights; and

1 WHEREAS, On Thursday, January 12, 2017, Dr. King would
2 have been 88 years of age; and

3 WHEREAS, On April 10, 1970, California became the first
4 state to pass legislation making Dr. King’s birthday a school
5 holiday and, subsequently, a statewide holiday; and

6 WHEREAS, Representative John Conyers (D-Michigan)
7 submitted the first legislation for a national Martin Luther King,
8 Jr. Holiday, which was signed into law by President Ronald Wilson
9 Reagan, on November 2, 1983; and

10 WHEREAS, January 20, 1986, marked the first observance of
11 a federal Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day; and

12 WHEREAS, Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement helped
13 change public policy from segregation to integration, resulting in
14 the repeal of the post-Reconstruction era state laws mandating
15 racial segregation in the south known as the “Jim Crow Laws,”
16 thereby leading to the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the
17 Voting Rights Act of 1965, and other antidiscrimination laws aimed
18 at ending economic, legal, and social segregation in America; and

19 WHEREAS, Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement helped
20 change public policy from legal and socially acceptable
21 discrimination and segregation to an open and accessible policy
22 of racial integration leading to equal participation and access to
23 primary and higher education, housing, employment, transportation,
24 federal, state, and local governmental elections, and other aspects
25 of public policy relating to human rights; and

26 WHEREAS, These public policy changes at the national level
27 influenced many changes in California that culminated in the
28 passage of the Unruh Civil Rights Act and the Rumford Fair
29 Housing Act, in open enrollment and access to higher education
30 specifically with respect to the California State University and the
31 University of California, and in employment and labor laws,
32 transportation policy, election laws, and other aspects of public
33 policy; and

34 WHEREAS, The unfinished business of Dr. King and the Civil
35 Rights Movement was and is the plight of the poor, the fight against
36 war and for worldwide peace, and the struggle for a fair, equitable,
37 and sensible economic system; and

38 WHEREAS, Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement noted
39 that a majority of Americans lived below the poverty line, and that

1 the huge income gaps between rich and poor called for “changes
2 in the structure of our society”; and

3 WHEREAS, Dr. King, in the last months of his life, began
4 organizing a Poor People’s Campaign to, among other things,
5 assemble “a multiracial army of the poor that would descend on
6 Washington—engaging in nonviolent civil disobedience at the
7 Capitol, if need be—until Congress enacted a poor people’s bill
8 of rights”; and

9 WHEREAS, All of the aforementioned concerns and more
10 continue to be the quest of civil and human rights organizations
11 in the great State of California, across America, and throughout
12 the world; and

13 WHEREAS, Dr. King fought to change public policy from the
14 “self-inflicted wound of segregation to the pluralistic diverse
15 democracy” we continue to construct today; and

16 WHEREAS, Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement serve as
17 a model for principled leadership and forward-thinking, bipartisan
18 public policy; now, therefore, be it

19 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
20 *thereof concurring*, That Monday, January 16, 2017, be observed
21 as the official memorial of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.’s birth and
22 his work in the Civil Rights Movement; and be it further

23 *Resolved*, That this day, Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement
24 be commemorated for their help in changing public policy from
25 segregation to integration, for the betterment of this, the great State
26 of California and these United States of America; and be it further

27 *Resolved*, That the California Legislature encourages all
28 Americans to pay tribute to the life and works of Dr. King through
29 participation in community service projects on Martin Luther King,
30 Jr. Day; and be it further

31 *Resolved*, That the California Legislature recognizes the inherent
32 value of community service and volunteerism in the creation of a
33 civil society and as a means of nonviolent community progress
34 consistent with the works of Dr. King; and be it further

35 *Resolved*, That the California Legislature recognizes the benefits
36 of the collaborative work by many organizations that promote,
37 facilitate, and carry out needed service projects nationwide; and
38 be it further

1 *Resolved*, That the California Legislature encourages its
2 members and colleagues to urge their constituents to participate
3 in community service projects; and be it further

4 *Resolved*, That the California Legislature acknowledges that,
5 by serving one’s country, one’s community, and one’s neighbor,
6 our nation makes progress in civility, equality, and unity consistent
7 with the values and life’s work of Dr. King.; and be it further

8 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
9 of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

SUBJECT: Martin Luther King, Jr. Day

SUMMARY: Designates that January 16, 2017, be observed as the official memorial of the late Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s birth and commemorate Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and the work of Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and the Civil Rights Movement helped change public policy from legal and socially acceptable discrimination and segregation to an open and accessible policy of racial integration leading to equal participation and access to education, employment, transportation, elections, and other aspects of public policy relating to human rights. These public policy changes influenced many changes in California public policy.
- 2) Monday, January 16, 2017, marks the 31st National Celebration of the National Holiday for Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and his fight for civil and human rights.
- 3) On April 10, 1970, California became the first state to pass legislation making Dr. King's birthday a school holiday and, subsequently, a statewide holiday.
- 4) Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement serve as a model for principled leadership and forward-thinking, bipartisan public policy.

**ADMINISTRATIVE ITEM:
ASSEMBLY STAFF SALARY POLICY**

ISSUE:

Adoption of a modified salary policy for Member staff.

BACKGROUND:

In 1998, the Assembly Committee on Rules adopted a salary policy. Since that time, the policy has been modified by Rules Committee action.

Attached is a revision of the salary policy for Member staff only. The policy would enable Members to retain and manage their staff more easily within their allotted budget.

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve

Assembly Staff Salary Policy (Member's Personal Staff)

All personnel transaction requests must be submitted to the Assembly Committee on Rules on a Personnel Transaction Record (PTR) form and are subject to budgetary constraints and Rules Committee's review and approval.

NEW HIRES

- Any new hire requested must be within the budget allocated to the Member and for the purpose of filling a vacant or other authorized position.
- A new hire must meet the requirements of the job duties outlined for the position they are being hired for and be paid within the set salary range of that job title.
- A Member may not have more than one employee classified as Chief of Staff, District Coordinator, or Legislative Director.
- A Member may not have more than two employees classified as Office Assistant/Secretary.
- A Member may not have more than two part-time employees in the Capitol Office and two part-time employees in the District Office. The part-time pay offered must be at least equal to the full-time equivalent of the minimum step for that classification.
- Prospective employees may not begin working for the Assembly without prior approval from Rules Committee. A Member must submit a PTR form with a completed New Hire Packet at least eight (8) working days prior to the requested start date. If the PTR form and New Hire Packet are not complete, they will be returned to the hiring office and the start date for the employee will be delayed accordingly.
- Time card employees must be offered an hourly wage consistent with the Assembly's Minimum Wage Policy for Hourly Employees adopted on May 5, 2016. Time card rates above \$15 per hour must be justified.
- Time card employees and temporary employees may not work for more than four (4) months in a year.
- Time card employees and temporary employees are not entitled to the Assembly benefits package.
- The Chief of Staff must send an email to Rules Committee on the first day the new employee starts working to confirm the date.

SALARY INCREASES AND/OR PROMOTIONS

- Any salary increase and/or promotion requested must be within the budget allocated to the Member.
- A Member may submit a request to increase an employee's salary no more than once in a 12-month period, unless the request is for the purpose of promoting an employee to a higher level classification.
- An increase shall not exceed the salary range of that job title.
- A promotion does not require a salary change if the employee's pay is within that classification range.
- The effective date of a salary increase may not precede the pay period in which the PTR form requesting the increase is received by the Rules Committee.

**ADMINISTRATIVE ITEM:
SELECTION OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE ON RULES CHAIR
FOR THE 2017-18 LEGISLATIVE SESSION**

ISSUE:

Selection of the Chair of the Joint Committee on Rules for the 2017-18 Legislative Session.

BACKGROUND:

Joint Rule 40 of the Temporary Joint Rules of the Senate and Assembly enumerates the duties of the Joint Committee on Rules. One of these duties is to select a chairperson from its membership. The vice-chairperson of the committee shall be one of the Senate members of the committee, to be selected by the Senate Committee on Rules.

The Chair of the Joint Committee on Rules has traditionally been the Chair of the Assembly Committee on Rules. Assemblymember Ken Cooley is the Chair of the Assembly Rules Committee.
