Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 256—Relative to Rosie's Day.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 256, as introduced, Reyes. Rosie's Day.

This measure would declare July 27, 2018, as California Bullying Prevention Day, also to be known as Rosie's Day.

Fiscal committee: no.

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WHEREAS, Bullying is defined as any severe or pervasive physical or verbal act or conduct, including communications made in writing or by means of an electronic act, that causes a reasonable pupil to suffer negative consequences due to a fear of harm; and

WHEREAS, Bullying behaviors are recognized as dangerous and harmful acts that victimize the targeted child and bystanders and these behaviors are characterized by a pattern of deliberate, negative, hurtful, and aggressive acts that work to shift the balance of physical, emotional, or social power; and

WHEREAS, The prevalence of bullying among children and youth is staggering, with studies nationally suggesting that more than one out of every five students report being bullied; and

WHEREAS, Thirty-three percent of students who reported being bullied at school nationwide indicate that they were bullied at least

15 once or twice a month during the school year; and

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WHEREAS, Cyberbullying can be defined as harassing, intimidating, or annoying another person via electronic communications; and

WHEREAS, According to reports from the Center for Disease Control, among high school students 15.5 percent are cyberbullied, a number that rises to nearly 25 percent for middle school students; and

WHEREAS, Only 23 percent of students who reported being cyberbullied notified an adult at school about the incident; and

WHEREAS, School bullying has been identified as a problematic behavior among adolescents, affecting school achievement, prosocial skills, and psychological well-being for both victims and perpetrators; and

WHEREAS, Children and youth who are bullied are more likely than other children to be depressed, lonely, or anxious; to have low self-esteem; to experience headaches, stomachaches, tiredness, and poor eating; to be absent from school, dislike school, and have poor school performance; and to think about suicide, or try to commit suicide; and

WHEREAS, Bullying can affect the social environment of a school, create a climate of fear among students, inhibit their ability to learn, and lead to other antisocial behavior; and

WHEREAS, School-based bullying prevention programs may include a combination of interventions schoolwide, at the classroom level, and at the individual level to create a social environment characterized by positive adult involvement, firm limits for unacceptable behavior, consistent use of sanctions for rule violations, and recognition that adults are the authorities; and

WHEREAS, Restorative justice may be an effective strategy to prevent bullying. Restorative justice is a form of conflict resolution that aims to make clear to the offender that his or her offending behavior is not condoned, while at the same time being supportive and respectful of the individual; and

WHEREAS, In December of 2017 Rosalie (Rosie) Avila, a teenager from Yucaipa, California, suffered multiple forms of bullying, including physical and verbal, both online and in person, and, sadly, she felt that the only course of action was to take her own life; and

WHEREAS, The life of Rosie Avila and all other students who have lost their lives due to bullying must be remembered; and

WHEREAS, We must do all we can to continue to educate, empower, and protect children throughout California when it comes to the topic of bullying and provide our young people with opportunities to acquire knowledge and develop into healthy and productive adults; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate thereof concurring, That the Legislature declares July 27, 2018, as California Bullying Prevention Day, also to be known as Rosie's Day, and recognizes the need for all of us as individuals, schools, communities, businesses, local governments, and the state to take action on behalf of bullying prevention in California; and be it further

- 3) Thirty-three percent of students who reported being bullied at school nationwide indicate that they were bullied at least once or twice a month during the school year.
- 4) Children and youth who are bullied are more likely than other children to be depressed, lonely, or anxious; to have low self-esteem; to experience headaches, stomachaches, tiredness, and poor eating; to be absent from school, dislike school, and have poor school performance; and, to think about suicide, or try to commit suicide.
- 5) In December 2017 Rosalie (Rosie) Avila, a teenager from Yucaipa, California, suffered multiple forms of bullying, including physical and verbal, both online and in person; and, sadly she felt that the only course of action was to take her own life.

- 4 More Americans are affected by epilepsy than by cerebral palsy,
- 5 multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy, and Parkinson's disease
- 6 combined; and
- 7 WHEREAS, Epilepsy affects approximately 427,000
- 8 Californians, 60,000 of whom are children under 18 years of age;
- 9 and
- WHEREAS, While epilepsy can begin at any age, it most commonly occurs in children; and
- WHEREAS, Epilepsy affects individuals with varying severity, sometimes having devastating impacts on all aspects of life; and
- WHEREAS, Early diagnosis and treatment of epilepsy is critical
 to maximizing long-term prognosis; and
- WHEREAS, A seizure is caused by an abnormal misfiring in the brain's electrical system; and
- 18 WHEREAS, Seizures can be extremely severe (tonic clonic,
- 19 formerly known as grand mal). However, a seizure can also be as
- 20 subtle as strange sensations or perceptions, altered awareness, brief
- 21 staring episodes, abnormal motions or postures, stiffness, or
- 22 confused speech; and
- WHEREAS, In children with epilepsy, uncontrolled seizures
- 24 damage the child's developing brain and can have a permanent

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1 impact on academic performance, memory, learning, and 2 social-emotional challenges; and

WHEREAS, Numerous organizations are already doing their part in furthering research for, and supporting patients with, pediatric epilepsy; and

WHEREAS, Pediatric Epilepsy Day will provide an opportunity for the community to become better aware of, and educated about, epilepsy; now, therefore, be it

- 1) Epilepsy is a neurological condition that affects over 3 million United States adults and 470,000 children according to the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
- 2) More Americans are affected by epilepsy than by cerebral palsy, multiple sclerosis, muscular dystrophy, and Parkinson's disease combined.
- 3) Epilepsy affects approximately 427,000 Californians, 60,000 of whom are children under 18 years of age. While epilepsy can begin at any age, it most commonly occurs in children.
- 4) Epilepsy affects individuals with varying severity, sometimes having devastating impacts on all aspects of life. Early diagnosis and treatment of epilepsy is critical to maximizing long-term prognosis.
- 5) In children with epilepsy, uncontrolled seizures damage the child's developing brain and can have a permanent impact on academic performance, memory, learning, and social-emotional challenges.
- 6) Pediatric Epilepsy Day will provide an opportunity for the community to become better aware of, and educated about, epilepsy.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SCR 86, as introduced, Nguyen. Veterans of the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day.

This measure would proclaim June 19, 2018, as Veterans of the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day.

- 1 WHEREAS, From 1965 to 1975, the Vietnam War brought
- 2 about the loss of approximately 250,000 members of the armed
- forces of the Republic of Vietnam and 58,000 members of the
- 4 United States Armed Forces fighting for the cause of freedom; and
- 5 WHEREAS, More than 300,000 members of the United States
- 6 Armed Forces and more than 1,000,000 members of the armed 7 forces of the Republic of Vietnam were injured; and
- 8 WHEREAS, After the fall of Saigon on April 30, 1975, more
- 9 than 250,000 members of the armed forces of the Republic of
- 10 Vietnam were sent to reeducation camps, where many spent up to
- 11 17 years in captivity and more than 20,000 died before they were
- 12 released; and
- WHEREAS, Thousands of veterans of the armed forces of the
- 14 Republic of Vietnam now reside in the United States and participate
- 15 in activities sponsored by American veterans, including Memorial
- 16 Day, and today there are an estimated 100,000 veterans from the
- 17 Republic of Vietnam living in California; and

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WHEREAS, All veterans who risked their lives fighting for freedom should be honored for their distinguished service in the Vietnam War and for the contributions they provide to the United States as American citizens, and it is the intent of the State of California to honor the sacrifices, commitment, dedication, and courage of everyone who fought for the freedom of the Republic of Vietnam; and

WHEREAS, The State of California recognizes the importance behind the principles of individual freedom in a just society promoting human rights and dignity, and joins with the veterans of the Republic of Vietnam to designate June 19 as a day of remembrance for Americans and Vietnamese who fought side by side for the ideals and values of democracy; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate of the State of California, the Assembly thereof concurring, That the Legislature recognizes June 19, 2018, as Veterans of the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day, in memory of the soldiers who sacrificed their lives for freedom and democracy and the victims of the Vietnam War, and in honor of the survivors, activists, and freedom fighters of that war; and be it further

SUBJECT: Veterans of the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day

SUMMARY: Proclaims June 19, 2018, as Veterans of the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day in honor of the sacrifices, commitment, dedication, and courage of everyone who fought for the freedom of the Republic of Vietnam. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) From 1965 to 1975, the Vietnam War brought about the loss of approximately 250,000 members of the armed forces of the Republic of Vietnam and 58,000 members of the United States Armed Forces fighting for the cause of freedom.
- 2) More than 300,000 members of the United States Armed Forces and more than 1,000,000 members of the armed forces of the Republic of Vietnam were injured.
- 3) After the fall of Saigon on April 30, 1975, more than 250,000 members of the armed forces of the Republic of Vietnam were sent to reeducation camps, where many spent up to 17 years in captivity and more than 20,000 died before they were released.
- 4) Thousands of veterans of the armed forces of the Republic of Vietnam now reside in the United States and participate in activities sponsored by American veterans, including Memorial Day. Today it is estimated that 100,000 veterans from the Republic of Vietnam are living in California.
- 5) All veterans who risked their lives fighting for freedom should be honored for their distinguished service in the Vietnam War and for the contributions they provide to the United States as American citizens.

SCR 146, as introduced, McGuire. California Grown Flower Month. This measure would proclaim June 2018 as California Grown Flower Month to recognize and honor the people of the California grown flower industry for their dedication and productivity.

- WHEREAS, In 1890, the Domoto family established California's
- 8 first commercial flower farm in Oakland; and
- 9 WHEREAS, To this day, California still has a year-round climate
- 10 that is perfect for growing hundreds of varieties of flowers; and
- WHEREAS, California flowers are grown across 701 million
- square feet of land, spanning the distance from the City of San

- 14 and up to the Oregon border; and

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WHEREAS, California is the largest producing state of fresh cut flowers in the country representing approximately 80 percent of all cut flowers grown in the United States; and

WHEREAS, California is the leading producer of lilies, irises, gerbera daisies, tulips, roses and orchids; and

WHEREAS, Much of the production of lilies, irises, and tulips is in the County of Humboldt, which is known for its ideal growing conditions, and is also where the legendary Stargazer lily was originally bred; and

WHEREAS, Approximately 50 percent of all California grown flowers are distributed to wholesale and retail customers outside of the state; and

WHEREAS, The economic activity of California flower farmers, wholesalers, and retail florists creates nearly 145,665 jobs in the state; and

WHEREAS, The total economic impact of business activity created by California-grown flower farmers', wholesalers', and retail florists' expenditures in the state is more than \$12.2 billion; and

WHEREAS, The amount of money generated by the California grown flower industry for additional jobs in the state is more than \$12.5 million per day; and

WHEREAS, The economic activities of California grown flower farmers, wholesalers, and retail florists generate nearly \$1.1 billion in additional taxes; and

WHEREAS, It is appropriate for all Californians to recognize our California grown flower farmers, wholesalers, retail florists, and others involved in providing such a bounty to our state and the nation; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Senate of the State of California, the Assembly thereof concurring, That the Legislature recognizes and honors the people of the California grown flower industry for their dedication and productivity and hereby proclaims the month of June 2018 as California Grown Flower Month; and be it further

- 3) To this day, California still has a year-round climate that is perfect for growing hundreds of varieties of flowers.
- 4) California is the largest producing state of fresh cut flowers in the country representing approximately 80 percent of all cut flowers grown in the United States; and, approximately 50 percent of all those flowers are distributed to wholesale and retail customers outside of the state.
- 5) The economic activities of California grown flower farmers, wholesalers, and retail florists generate \$1.1 billion in additional taxes. The total economic impact of business activity created by California-grown flower farmers', wholesalers', and retail florists' expenditures in the state is more than \$12.2 billion.
