House Resolution No. 42—Relative to Immigrant Heritage Month.

1 WHEREAS, Generations of immigrants from all around the
2 world built our country’s economy and created our nation’s unique
3 character; and
4 WHEREAS, More than 40 million immigrants are residing in
5 the United States, constituting 15 percent of the general United
6 States workforce, and they account for around a quarter of United
7 States entrepreneurs; and
8 WHEREAS, Immigrants and their children make up 42 percent
9 of California’s population. Of all children in California, 47 percent
10 have at least one parent who is an immigrant and 75 percent of
11 noncitizens live in households with citizens; and
12 WHEREAS, Immigrants continue to develop and expand
13 businesses, innovate, strengthen our economy, and create American
14 jobs in California; and
15 WHEREAS, Immigrants comprise more than 35 percent of
16 California’s civilian workforce, accounting for over two-thirds of
17 all agricultural workers; nearly one-half of all workers in the
18 manufacturing industry; over 40 percent of all workers in wholesale
19 trade, construction, and other service industries; 41 percent of all
20 workers in computer and mathematical occupations; and 57 percent
21 of all software developers and workers in applications and systems
22 software; and

1 WHEREAS, One in three small business owners in California
2 are immigrants, immigrants founded around 45 percent of all new
3 businesses from 2007 to 2011, inclusive, and immigrants make up
4 36 percent of the state's business owners; and

5 WHEREAS, Immigrant households make up 28 percent of the
6 total household income in California, representing a substantial
7 share of spending power in the state; and

8 WHEREAS, Immigrants contribute \$715 billion of California
9 gross domestic product, \$4.6 billion in sales taxes, and \$3.1 billion
10 in local and states taxes; and

11 WHEREAS, Immigrants fundamentally enrich the extraordinary
12 character of our state and nation with their unique cultures,
13 heritages, religious beliefs, and experiences; and

14 WHEREAS, Immigrants have been tireless leaders, not only in
15 securing their own rights and ensuring access to equal
16 opportunities, but also in pursuing a fairer and more just society
17 for all Americans; and

18 WHEREAS, Despite countless contributions made by
19 immigrants, we have frequently overlooked and undervalued the
20 role of immigrants in building and enriching our nation, both
21 throughout our history and in the present day; now, therefore, be
22 it

One in three small business owners in California are immigrants, immigrants founded around 45 percent of all new businesses from 2007 to 2011, inclusive, and immigrants make up 36 percent of the state's business owners.
- 5) Immigrant households make up 28 percent of the total household income in California, representing a substantial share of spending power in the state; and, immigrants contribute \$715 billion of California gross domestic product, \$4.6 billion in sales taxes, and \$3.1 billion in local and state taxes.
- 6) Immigrants fundamentally enrich the extraordinary character of our state and nation with their unique cultures, heritages, religious beliefs, and experiences; and, have been tireless leaders, not only in securing their own rights and ensuring access to equal opportunities, but also in pursuing a fairer and more just society for all Americans.

Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 50—Relative to International Midwives’ Day.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

SCR 50, as introduced, Skinner. International Midwives’ Day.

This measure would recognize May 5, 2019, as International Midwives’ Day.

Fiscal committee: no.

- 1 WHEREAS, Midwives save lives; well-trained midwives may
2 help avert nearly two-thirds of all maternal and newborn deaths,
3 according to the United Nations Population Fund’s reference to
4 the most recent State of the World’s Midwifery report; and
5 WHEREAS, Midwives could also deliver 87 percent of all
6 essential sexual, reproductive, maternal, and newborn health
7 services, but only 42 percent of individuals with midwifery skills
8 work in the 73 countries in which more than 90 percent of all
9 maternal and newborn deaths and stillbirths occur; and
10 WHEREAS, The world has seen a steady decline in maternal
11 and newborn deaths since 1990, but hundreds of thousands of
12 women and newborns still die each year during pregnancy and
13 childbirth; and

1 WHEREAS, An estimated 303,000 women and 2.7 million
2 newborn babies died in 2015 alone and the vast majority of those
3 who lost their lives did so due to complications and illnesses that
4 could have been prevented had they had the proper prenatal,
5 delivery, and postnatal care services provided by midwives; and

6 WHEREAS, Midwives do not only deliver babies, but also
7 provide comprehensive sexual and reproductive health services,
8 and they assume a critical role in promoting health within
9 communities; and

10 WHEREAS, Midwives, as members of their communities, also
11 provide culturally sensitive care that is likely to have more of a
12 lasting impact on those that they serve; and

13 WHEREAS, Midwives, and those with midwifery skills, are
14 the primary caregivers for women and their children during
15 pregnancy, labor, childbirth, and in the postdelivery period; and

16 WHEREAS, A well-trained midwife also can provide
17 comprehensive sexual and reproductive health information and
18 services, including prenatal care, safe delivery care, and postpartum
19 and postnatal care; and

20 WHEREAS, Midwives also provide family planning services
21 and counseling, and they can perform breast and cervical cancer
22 screenings; and

23 WHEREAS, Midwives, if authorized by their countries,
24 additionally can perform basic emergency obstetric care, and in
25 humanitarian crises and emergencies can help implement the
26 minimum initial services package needed for reproductive health
27 care services; and

28 WHEREAS, Midwives also do much to advance the human
29 rights of women and girls; by providing information and
30 counseling, they can help prevent female genital mutilation; they
31 also can offer support and assistance to survivors of gender-based
32 violence, and they can provide reproductive health services to
33 adolescents who are often denied access to these services at great
34 expense to their health and rights; and

35 WHEREAS, Midwives, when they are properly trained and
36 supported, provide one of the most cost-effective and culturally
37 sensitive ways of achieving universal health care; yet, midwives
38 are in such short supply in many developing countries, and often
39 lack the skills and a supportive environment in which to perform

8 all that midwives do save lives, prevent maternal and newborn

10 and advance human rights; now, therefore, be it

12 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature hereby recognizes May
13 5, 2019, as International Midwives' Day; and be it further

- 3) Midwives, if authorized by their countries, additionally can perform basic emergency obstetric care, and in humanitarian crises and emergencies can help implement the minimum initial services package needed for reproductive health care services.
- 4) Midwives also do much to advance the human rights of women and girls; by providing information and counseling, they can help prevent female genital mutilation; they also can offer support and assistance to survivors of gender-based violence, and they can provide reproductive health services to adolescents who are often denied access to these services at great expense to their health and rights.
- 5) Midwives, when they are properly trained and supported, provide one of the most cost-effective and culturally sensitive ways of achieving universal health care; yet, midwives are in such short supply in many developing countries, and often lack the skills and a supportive environment in which to perform their jobs well; and the deficits in midwives are highest in the areas where the needs are the greatest.
- 6) Many challenges exist to increasing the supply of midwifery services; despite the enormous responsibilities they assume, midwives—who are overwhelmingly women—often endure poor pay, low status, and a lack of support.
- 7) International Midwives' Day serves to remind us all that midwives do save lives, prevent maternal and newborn deaths, avert complications and preventable deaths and illnesses, and advanced human rights.
