Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 59—Relative to Portuguese Heritage Month.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

ACR 59, as introduced, Aguiar-Curry. Portuguese Heritage Month.

This measure would declare the month of June 2021, as Portuguese Heritage Month, in recognition of June 10 as the Day of Portugal, and June 1 as the Day of the Azores.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, Portuguese presence in California predates the
2 establishment of California as a State in the Union; and

3 WHEREAS, The first Portuguese settlers came to California
4 from the Azores Islands in the early 19th century. Waves of
5 Azorean immigrants moved to California just before and during
6 the 20th century, with the first wave of Azorean immigrants
7 moving to California just before and after the turn of the 20th
8 century, followed by the second and largest wave between 1958
9 and 1976, each contributing substantially to setting up agricultural
10 operations, especially dairy, livestock, vegetable, fruit farms, and
11 the tuna industry in southern California; and

12 WHEREAS, Throughout most of the 20th century, as many as
13 one-half of all Portuguese Californians owned or operated a dairy
14 farm, worked on a dairy farm, or worked in a dairy-related industry.

1 Applying the Portuguese belief in hard work and thriftiness, along
2 with additional labor from family members, Portuguese settlers
3 could earn enough to reinvest in their businesses, and buy more
4 land and cattle. Still today, Portuguese Americans in California
5 continue to play an important role in agriculture and dairying, as
6 proprietors and innovators; and

7 WHEREAS, Historically, California has been a popular
8 destination for immigrants from the Azores Islands, creating strong
9 cultural ties between the two regions; currently there are more than
10 350,000 persons of Portuguese heritage living in California,
11 approximately 90 percent of whom have either come directly from
12 the Azores Islands or are of Azorean ancestry; and

13 WHEREAS, In early 1855, the Old Company of Portuguese
14 Whalers, a 15-member enterprise, was owned and operated by
15 Azoreans in the City of Monterey, and, in the City of San Diego,
16 Portuguese immigrants, mostly from the islands of the Azores and
17 Madeira, had a prominent position in the tuna industry; and

18 WHEREAS, The Portuguese fraternal movement has played a
19 role in the financial and cultural stability of the community, led
20 today by two societies, the Portuguese Fraternal Society of America
21 and the Luso-American Fraternal Federation, with headquarters
22 in this state; and

23 WHEREAS, Portuguese language courses taught at community
24 heritage schools, public elementary and high schools, community
25 colleges, the California State University system, University of
26 California campuses, and private colleges build cognizance of the
27 importance of the Portuguese language as a world language and
28 awareness to the contributions that Californians of Portuguese
29 ancestry have given this state, as well as building exchanges with
30 colleges and universities in Portugal, including the recently created
31 Portuguese Beyond Borders Institute at the California State
32 University, Fresno, with its new approach to conferences, oral
33 history, research, academic publications, symposiums, exchange
34 programs in agriculture, and community outreach, including the
35 only Azorean Diaspara Center in the CSU system; and

36 WHEREAS, Californians of Portuguese ancestry came together
37 in 2016 to create the California Portuguese American Coalition
38 sponsored by the Luso-American Development Foundation to
39 create a network of public servants of Portuguese ancestry and
40 elected officials who represent areas where Californians of

1 Portuguese ancestry live and contribute to our rich diversity and
2 to encourage young Portuguese Americans to participate in our
3 democracy through public service; and

4 WHEREAS, In March of 2018 Californians of Portuguese
5 ancestry created the only strategic plan in the United States to
6 teach the Portuguese language and cultures in California public
7 and private schools, colleges, and universities in order to contribute
8 to the rich linguistic and cultural diversity of our state and to foster
9 a deeper connection to, and increase economic opportunities
10 between, California and all the Portuguese-speaking countries
11 throughout the world; and

12 WHEREAS, The State of California has a sister state relationship
13 with the Autonomous Region of the Azores, adopted in 2002, and
14 recently revised by working with a Friends of the Azores group
15 to bring further development in not only cultural exchanges, but
16 also in important areas such as renewable energy, sustainable
17 agriculture, tourism, and technology; and

18 WHEREAS, Among the great Portuguese Americans who have
19 contributed significantly to this country are: composer John Philip
20 Sousa, best known for composing “Stars and Stripes Forever”;
21 poet Emma Lazarus, best known for her sonnet about the Statue
22 of Liberty, “The New Colossus”; and architect William L. Pereira,
23 best known for designing the Transamerica Pyramid in San
24 Francisco. Many Portuguese Americans have also served with
25 distinction in local, state, and federal office, and have served
26 proudly in this country’s military; and

27 WHEREAS, Portuguese Americans have made valuable and
28 substantial contributions to every facet of California life including
29 the entertainment industry, the most notable of whom are Mary
30 Astor, Katy Perry, Tom Hanks, Joe Perry, Nuno Bettencourt, Steve
31 Perry, and James Franco; and

32 WHEREAS, The Portuguese community press, through radio,
33 newspaper, and television, have been important vehicles in
34 maintaining the Portuguese American experience in California,
35 serving as bridges to our multicultural state, currently through the
36 Tribuna Portuguesa, the only bilingual Portuguese newspaper in
37 the western United States; and

38 WHEREAS, The Portuguese Heritage Society of California
39 built the Portuguese Historical Museum to serve as a center for
40 the display of Portuguese heritage and culture, and the Portuguese

1 Heritage Publications of California, through book publications,
2 have recorded Portuguese contributions to this state in various
3 facets; and

4 WHEREAS, The Portuguese Holy Ghost Festival and other
5 religious and cultural festivals are an important part of the
6 communities in which they are held, bringing communities together
7 and preserving and disseminating in mainstream California the
8 rich traditions of a proud people who are completely integrated
9 into Californian society; now, therefore, be it

10 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
11 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature hereby declares the month
12 of June 2021, as Portuguese Heritage Month, in recognition of
13 June 10 as the Day of Portugal, and June 1 as the Day of the
14 Azores; and be it further

15 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
16 of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 72—Relative to veterans.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

ACR 72, as introduced, Nguyen. Veterans of the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day.

This measure would proclaim June 19, 2021, as Veterans of the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, The Republic of Vietnam Military Forces, or South
2 Vietnamese Armed Forces, were formally established on December
3 30, 1955, by Ngo Dinh Diem, the first President of South Vietnam;
4 and

5 WHEREAS, The Republic of Vietnam Military Forces consisted
6 of four branches: the Army of the Republic of Vietnam, the
7 Republic of Vietnam Air Force, the Republic of Vietnam Navy,
8 and the Republic of Vietnam Marine Division; and

9 WHEREAS, The duties of all four branches included: protecting
10 the sovereignty of the free Vietnamese nation and that of the
11 Republic, maintaining the political and social order and the rule
12 of law by providing internal security, defending the newly
13 independent Republic of Vietnam from external and internal
14 threats, and ultimately, helping to reunify Vietnam, a country that
15 had been divided since the Geneva Accords of 1954; and

1 WHEREAS, The Vietnam War brought about the loss of more
2 than 250,000 members of the South Vietnamese Armed Forces
3 and more than 58,000 members of the United States Armed Forces;
4 and

5 WHEREAS, More than 300,000 members of the United States
6 Armed Forces and more than 1,000,000 members of the South
7 Vietnamese Armed Forces were injured; and

8 WHEREAS, After the Fall of Saigon on April 30, 1975, more
9 than 250,000 members of the South Vietnamese Armed Forces
10 were sent to prison camps, where many spent 18 years or more in
11 captivity and more than 20,000 died before they were released;
12 and

13 WHEREAS, The end of the Vietnam War left the South
14 Vietnamese Armed Forces in disarray. Many military personnel
15 and their family members fled Vietnam to escape tyrannical
16 authoritarian rule and oppression, and hoped to find democracy
17 and freedom in the United States and other free nations. They spent
18 months at sea and in jungles, battling hunger, thirst, and separation
19 from their families and loved ones; and

20 WHEREAS, Many of those who reached the United States found
21 refuge in California and in various states throughout the country.
22 They faced socioeconomic challenges but were determined to build
23 entirely new lives here; and

24 WHEREAS, In the United States, these military personnel
25 continued to fight for their home country and the people there.
26 They have been a strong voice for democracy, religious freedom,
27 and human rights in Vietnam and have contributed culturally and
28 economically to our society and to the diversity of our nation; and

29 WHEREAS, These veterans were fighting side by side with
30 American soldiers against a common enemy and risked their lives
31 to save many American lives. All veterans who risked their lives
32 fighting for freedom should be honored for their distinguished
33 service in the Vietnam War and for the contributions they provide
34 to the United States as American citizens, and it is the intent of
35 the State of California to honor the sacrifices, commitment,
36 dedication, and courage of everyone who fought for the freedom
37 of the Republic of Vietnam; and

38 WHEREAS, Annually, Vietnamese Americans around the world
39 recognize the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day on June

1 19, and this year, 2021, marks the 56th anniversary of this annual
2 commemoration; and

3 WHEREAS, Thousands of veterans of the South Vietnamese
4 Armed Forces now reside in the United States and participate in
5 activities sponsored by American veterans, including Memorial
6 Day, Veterans Day, and Independence Day, and today there are
7 more than 100,000 veterans from the Republic of Vietnam living
8 in California; and

9 WHEREAS, These servicemembers who paid the ultimate
10 sacrifice for their nation and have contributed greatly to the
11 development of our society deserve to be honored and recognized;
12 now, therefore, be it

13 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
14 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature recognizes June 19, 2021,
15 as Veterans of the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day, in
16 memory of the soldiers who sacrificed their lives for freedom and
17 democracy and the victims of the Vietnam War, and in honor of
18 the survivors, activists, and freedom fighters of that war; and be
19 it further

20 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
21 of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

SUBJECT: Veterans of the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day.

SUMMARY: Proclaims June 19, 2021, as Veterans of the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day, in memory of the soldiers who sacrificed their lives for freedom and democracy and the victims of the Vietnam War, and in honor of the survivors, activists, and freedom fighters of that war. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) The Republic of Vietnam Military Forces consisted of four branches: the Army of the Republic of Vietnam, the Republic of Vietnam Air Force, the Republic of Vietnam Navy, and the Republic of Vietnam Marine Division.
- 2) The duties of all four branches included: protecting the sovereignty of the free Vietnamese nation and that of the Republic, maintaining the political and social order and the rule of law by providing internal security, defending the newly independent Republic of Vietnam from external and internal threats; and, ultimately, helping to reunify Vietnam, a country that had been divided since the Geneva Accords of 1954.
- 3) The Vietnam War brought about the loss of more than 250,000 members of the South Vietnamese Armed Forces and more than 58,000 members of the United States Armed Forces. More than 300,000 members of the United States Armed Forces and more than 1,000,000 members of the South Vietnamese Armed Forces were injured.
- 4) The end of the Vietnam War left the South Vietnamese Armed Forces in disarray. Many military personnel and their family members fled Vietnam, and hoped to find democracy and freedom in the United States and other free nations. They spent months at sea and in jungles, battling hunger, thirst, and separation from their families and loved ones.
- 5) Many of those who reached the United States found refuge in California and in various states throughout the country. They faced socioeconomic challenges but were determined to build entirely new lives here.
- 6) Annually, Vietnamese Americans around the world recognize the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces Day on June 19, and this year, 2021, marks the 56th anniversary of this annual commemoration.
- 7) These servicemembers who paid the ultimate sacrifice for their nation and have contributed greatly to the development of our society deserve to be honored and recognized.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 90—Relative to USS Liberty Day.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

ACR 90, as introduced, Mathis. USS Liberty Day.

This measure would proclaim June 8, 2021, as USS Liberty Day.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, The USS Liberty was a United States Navy
2 technical research ship, known colloquially as a “spy ship,” that
3 was attacked by Israeli Air Force jet fighter aircraft and Israeli
4 Navy motor torpedo boats on June 8, 1967, in international waters
5 north of the Sinai Peninsula during the Six-Day War; and

6 WHEREAS, Despite the United States’ declaration of neutrality
7 during the Six-Day War, the USS Liberty was subject to the attack
8 as a result of Israeli armed forces’ error in designating the ship as
9 an enemy vessel; and

10 WHEREAS, The attack resulted in 34 American casualties, 171
11 American injuries, and a heavily damaged ship. Personnel included
12 naval officers, seamen, two Marines, and one civilian National
13 Security Agency (NSA) employee; and

14 WHEREAS, In the days preceding the start of the Six-Day War,
15 the USS Liberty was ordered to travel east across the Mediterranean
16 Sea to perform a signals intelligence collection mission in
17 international waters off the coast of Sinai, Egypt; and

1 WHEREAS, As the war unfolded, several instances of
2 miscommunication, confusion, and misidentification among
3 American and Israeli forces culminated in the mistaken attack on
4 the USS Liberty; and

5 WHEREAS, The ship was severely damaged, but its remaining
6 crew members were able to keep it afloat and, subsequently,
7 maneuver it out of the area. It eventually made its way back to the
8 United States before it was sold for scrap in 1973; and

9 WHEREAS, Although significant controversy and disputes
10 continue to obscure the motives of the attack on the USS Liberty,
11 the heroism and bravery of all those aboard the ship must not be
12 forgotten; and

13 WHEREAS, It is appropriate to take the time to honor and pay
14 tribute to both the ship as a symbol of American perseverance and
15 to its crew members who endured this tragedy, as their actions in
16 the face of adversity still represent a patriotic commitment and
17 service to this country; now, therefore, be it

18 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
19 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature hereby proclaims June 8,
20 2021, as USS Liberty Day; and be it further

21 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
22 of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

- 7) It is appropriate to take the time to honor and pay tribute to both the ship as a symbol of American perseverance and to its crew members who endured this tragedy, as their actions in the face of adversity still represent a patriotic commitment and service to this country.
