#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 246, as introduced, Calderon. World Oceans Day.

This measure would recognize June 8th as World Oceans Day, and would declare that the Legislature intends to act decisively in 2018 in regard to passing legislation aimed at reducing plastic pollution in California rivers, beaches, and oceans, and would further declare that the State of California is determined to seek additional ways to curb plastic pollution on those waterways and beaches, and in other natural spaces and communities.

enters our ocean every minute, and 80 percent of the ocean's plastic
comes from land-based sources; and

WHEREAS, Microplastics, which are small particles of plastic
including microbeads and microfibers, are now being found
ubiquitously in waterways and oceans around the world; and

WHEREAS, Research now shows how plastic and associated
toxins are being found throughout the ocean's ecosystem, including
in seafood sold for human consumption; and

WHEREAS, Most of the plastic pollution in our communities, waterways, and oceans comes from single-use items, such as cigarette butts, straws, plastic bottles and bottle caps, and takeaway items, including containers, cups, and utensils; and

WHEREAS, Local governments throughout California spend approximately \$428 million each year to prevent litter in streets, storm drains, waterways, and beaches; and

WHEREAS, Source reduction is a less expensive and more effective way to minimize plastic pollution than cleaning it up or otherwise mitigating its impact; and

WHEREAS, World Oceans Day is a worldwide movement of citizens on behalf of the ocean to mobilize and unite the world's population on a project for the sustainable management of the world's oceans; and

WHEREAS, World Oceans Day celebrates the beauty, wealth,
 and promise of the ocean; now, therefore, be it

#### AMENDED IN ASSEMBLY APRIL 9, 2018

#### Introduced by Senator Vidak

February 16, 2017

An act to amend Section <u>19601.4 of the Business and Professions</u> Code, relating to horse racing. 5050 of, and to add Section 2081.12 to, the Fish and Game Code, relating to endangered species.

#### LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 495, as amended, Vidak. Horse racing: wagering: fairs: facilities maintenance and improvement funds. Endangered species: blunt-nosed leopard lizard: taking or possession.

Existing law prohibits the taking or possession of a fully protected reptile or amphibian, except as provided, and designates the blunt-nosed leopard lizard as a fully protected reptile. The California Endangered Species Act prohibits the taking of an endangered or threatened species, except as specified. Under that act, the Department of Fish and Wildlife is permitted to authorize, by permit, the take of listed species if the take is incidental to an otherwise lawful activity and the impacts are minimized and fully mitigated.

This bill would permit the department to authorize, under the California Endangered Species Act, the take or possession of the blunt-nosed leopard lizard resulting from impacts attributable to or otherwise related to the Allensworth Community Services District Safe Drinking Water Project to drill a new water well for the community of Allensworth and the Colonel Allensworth State Historic Park, if specified conditions are met. The bill would also make a conforming change.

Existing law, the Horse Racing Law, authorizes a fair, a combination of fairs, or an association conducting racing at a fair, after approval

from the California Horse Racing Board, to contribute 1% of the total amount handled daily in conventional and exotic pools for facilities maintenance and improvements at a fair's racetrack inclosure, for those fairs that contribute or those fairs where an association conducting racing at that fair contributes. Existing law requires that the money raised be deposited into the Inclosure Facilities Improvement Fund, which is created as a special fund in the State Treasury, and that money be made available upon appropriation by the Legislature in the annual Budget Act. Existing law requires the Secretary of Food and Agriculture to appoint a committee to advise on the administration of the funds, and requires the secretary to include in the annual expenditure plan any allocations made pursuant to these provisions, as specified.

This bill would remove the requirement that the secretary include in the annual expenditure plan any allocations made pursuant to these provisions.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 2081.12 is added to the Fish and Game 2 Code, to read:

3 2081.12. (a) The department may authorize, under this chapter,

16 department, for monitoring the effectiveness of, and adjusting as

(b) This section shall not be construed to exempt the projectdescribed in subdivision (a) from any other law.

1 SEC. 2. Section 5050 of the Fish and Game Code is amended 2 to read:

3 5050. (a) (1) Except as provided in this section, or Section 4 2081.7, Section 2081.9, 2081.12, or Section 2835, a fully protected 5 reptile or amphibian may not be taken or possessed at any time. 6 No provision of this code or any other law shall be construed to 7 authorize the issuance of a permit or license to take a fully 8 protected reptile or amphibian, and no permit or license previously 9 issued shall have any force or effect for that purpose. However, 10 the department may authorize the taking of a fully protected reptile or amphibian for necessary scientific research, including efforts 11 12 to recover fully protected, threatened, or endangered species. Before authorizing the take of a fully protected reptile or 13 14 amphibian, the department shall make an effort to notify all 15 affected and interested parties to solicit information and comments 16 on the proposed authorization. The notification shall be published 17 in the California Regulatory Notice Register and be made available 18 to each person who has notified the department, in writing, of his or her interest in fully protected species and who has provided an 19 20 email address, if available, or postal address to the department. Affected and interested parties shall have 30 days after notification 21 22 is published in the California Regulatory Notice Register to provide 23 relevant information and comments on the proposed authorization. 24 (2) As used in this subdivision, "scientific research" does not 25 include an action taken as part of specified mitigation for a project, as defined in Section 21065 of the Public Resources Code. 26 27 (3) A legally imported fully protected reptile or amphibian may be possessed under a permit issued by the department. 28 29 (b) The following are fully protected reptiles and amphibians: 30 (1) Blunt-nosed leopard lizard (Crotaphytus wislizenii silus).

31 (*Gambelia sila*).

32 (2) San Francisco garter snake (Thamnophis sirtalis tetrataenia).

33 (3) Santa Cruz long-toed salamander (Ambystoma 34 macrodactylum croceum).

35 (4) Limestone salamander (Hydromantes brunus).

36 (5) Black toad (Bufo boreas exsul).

37 SECTION 1. Section 19601.4 of the Business and Professions
 38 Code is amended to read:

39 19601.4. (a) Notwithstanding any other law, a fair,

1 may, after approval from the board, deduct an additional 1 percent

Re: SB 495 Urgency Request Explanation

Dear Assemblymember Cooley,

I write to respectfully request urgency be added to my SB 495 which relates to the community of Allensworth and Colonel Allensworth State Historic Park.

The community of Allensworth requires a new water well as theirs has unsafe levels of arsenic in the water. They have acquired a site and completed a successful test well, but the property has been found to have blunt-nose leopard lizard burrows. These lizards are considered fully protected species as defined under FGC Chapter 2, Section 5050. For these lizards any annoyance or observation, even to check the burrows for the lizard's presence, would be considered take.

The community has asked to create a temporary exemption to authorize incidental take of the blunts-nose leopard lizards for this particular well. The bill is urgently needed as the blunt-nose leopard lizard is only active in August, thus observations must be completed this summer to comply with CEQA requirements and keep the project on schedule.
