LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

ACR 192, as introduced, Gordon. California Nonprofits Day.

This measure would designate June 22, 2016, as California Nonprofits Day and recognize the importance of nonprofit organizations to the economy and well-being of this state.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, Nonprofit organizations are a large and vital part
2 of California’s economy, with nonprofit economic activity
3 contributing 15 percent, or one-sixth, of California’s gross state
4 product; and

5 WHEREAS, Nonprofit organizations rank as the fourth largest
6 industry in California by employment, with nearly one million
7 people employed by nonprofits, accounting for 1 in every 16
8 California jobs; and

9 WHEREAS, Each year nonprofit organizations bring in at least
10 \$40 billion in revenue to California from out-of-state sources; and

11 WHEREAS, California nonprofit organizations employ greater
12 percentages of women and people of color than the overall civilian
13 workforce; and

14 WHEREAS, California nonprofit organizations are trusted
15 institutions that exist to provide services to the needy and

1 vulnerable, improve quality of life, express community values,
2 and promote social change; and

3 WHEREAS, The nonprofit organization community in California
4 is a strong economic power that uses that power for the common
5 good; and

6 WHEREAS, California's nonprofit organizations are national
7 and international groundbreakers and leaders in the environment,
8 in science, in safety net innovations, in civil rights, in the arts and
9 humanities, and in the pursuit of democratic ideals; now, therefore,
10 be it

11 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
12 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature, in recognition of the
13 importance of nonprofit organizations to the economy and
14 well-being of this state, declares June 22, 2016, as California
15 Nonprofits Day; and be it further

16 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies

SUMMARY: Designates June 22, 2016, as California Nonprofits Day and recognizes the importance of nonprofit organizations to the economy and well-being of this state. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) Nonprofit organizations are a large and vital part of California's economy, with nonprofit economic activity contributing 15 percent, or one-sixth, of California's gross state product.
- 2) Each year nonprofit organizations bring in at least \$40 billion in revenue to California from out-of-state sources.
- 3) Nonprofit organizations rank as the fourth largest industry in California by employment, with nearly one million people employed by nonprofits, accounting for 1 in every 16 California jobs.
- 4) California's nonprofit organizations are national and international groundbreakers and leaders in the environment, in science, in safety net innovations, in civil rights, in the arts and humanities, and in the pursuit of democratic ideals.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SCR 140, as introduced, Cannella. Foster Care Awareness Month.
This measure would acknowledge the month of May 2016 as Foster Care Awareness Month.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, The foster care system in the State of California
2 is a network of government agencies, private, community, and
3 faith-based organizations, families, and individuals working
4 together to provide children and youth safe and supportive living
5 situations when their families are unable to do so; and
6 WHEREAS, The foster care system was developed in the early
7 part of the 20th century based on the premise that a child is better
8 off in a home, rather than an orphanage, even if the child only lives
9 in that home temporarily; and
10 WHEREAS, The goal of many foster care programs is to reunite
11 children with their parents when their parents are able to provide
12 safe and stable homes; and
13 WHEREAS, About 53 percent of the children entering foster
14 care successfully reunite with their parents; and

1 WHEREAS, Many counties in the State of California have
2 reduced the number of children and youth entering foster care by
3 helping at-risk families access community services that provide
4 the skills and resources these families need to effectively care for
5 their children; and

6 WHEREAS, Although the State of California recognizes the
7 importance of maintaining strong, vital connections among foster
8 children and youth, their siblings, and extended families, the state
9 acknowledges that 9 percent will exit foster care to live with
10 nonparent relatives or guardians and 38 percent of children entering
11 foster care will not be reunited with their families; and

12 WHEREAS, To ensure those children receive the best care, the
13 State of California has developed many programs designed to find
14 permanent families for children in foster care, assist older youth
15 in securing meaningful, supportive transitions from foster care,
16 and expand the support of relatives, foster parents, and adoptive
17 caregivers who provide permanent homes to foster children; and

18 WHEREAS, The State of California continues to revise its foster
19 care policies in order to develop a comprehensive approach to
20 assessing the needs of children and families, finding home-based
21 family care placements, supporting these placements with services,
22 and developing thorough information about and an understanding
23 of how children and youth are affected by and benefit from state
24 foster care programs; and

25 WHEREAS, The State of California is committed to improving
26 the lives of all children and youth touched by the child welfare
27 system by working in partnership with all organizations involved
28 in the foster care system and the adoption process; now, therefore,
29 be it

30 *Resolved by the Senate of the State of California, the Assembly*
31 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature declares the month of
32 May 2016 as Foster Care Awareness Month; and be it further

SUMMARY: Acknowledges the month of May 2016 as Foster Care Awareness Month. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) The foster care system in California is a network of government agencies, private, community, and faith-based organizations, families, and individuals working together to provide children and youth safe and supportive living situations when their families are unable to do so.
- 2) Many California counties have reduced the number of children and youth entering foster care by helping at-risk families access community services that provide the skills and resources these families need to effectively care for their children.
- 3) Although the State recognizes the importance of maintaining strong, vital connections among foster children and youth, their siblings, and extended families, the state acknowledges that 9% will exit foster care to live with nonparent relatives or guardians and 38% of children entering foster care will not be reunited with their families.
- 4) To ensure those children receive the best care, the State has developed many programs designed to find permanent families for children in foster care, assist older youth in securing meaningful, supportive transitions from foster care, and expand the support of relatives, foster parents, and adoptive caregivers who provide permanent homes to foster children.
- 5) The State continues to revise its foster care policies in order to develop a comprehensive approach to assessing the needs of children and families, finding home-based family care placements, supporting these placements with services, and developing thorough information about and an understanding of how children and youth are affected by and benefit from state foster care programs.
- 6) The State is committed to improving the lives of all children and youth touched by the child welfare system by working in partnership with all organizations involved in the foster care system and the adoption process.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SCR 143, as introduced, Cannella. National Bike Month.

This measure would designate the month of May 2016 as National Bike Month in California and would encourage Californians to ride bicycles for commuting and recreation.

1 WHEREAS, National Bike Month was established in 1956 by
2 the League of American Bicyclists as a way to showcase the many
3 benefits of bicycling and encourage others to give biking a try;
4 and
5 WHEREAS, The League of American Bicyclists has ranked the
6 State of California as the 8th most bicycle-friendly state, based on
7 the state's 56 bicycle-friendly communities, 92 bicycle-friendly
8 businesses, and 14 bicycle-friendly universities; and
9 WHEREAS, National Bike Month is an opportunity to celebrate
10 the unique power of the bicycle and the many reasons to ride, such
11 as biking to work or school, riding to save money or time,
12 preserving health or the environment, or exploring local
13 communities; and
14 WHEREAS, The bicycle is an economic, healthy, convenient,
15 and environmentally sound form of transportation and an excellent

1 tool for recreation and the enjoyment California's scenic beauty;
2 and

3 WHEREAS, Creating a bicycle-friendly community has been
4 credited with improving the health of local residents, growing local
5 economies, attracting tourism dollars, and reducing pollution and
6 road congestion; and

7 WHEREAS, In 2012, bicycling became the third most popular
8 and second most frequent outdoor activity among adults in the
9 United States with 51 percent of bicycle trips made for utilitarian
10 purposes such as commuting; and

11 WHEREAS, The number of bicyclists is growing rapidly
12 throughout the United States. The National Household Travel
13 Survey showed that the number of trips made by bicycle in the
14 United States more than doubled from 1.7 billion in 2001 to 4
15 billion in 2009; and

16 WHEREAS, The League of American Bicyclists estimate that
17 Americans saved \$4.6 billion in 2012 by bicycling instead of
18 driving an automobile, based on the annual operating expense of
19 \$308 for a bicycle and an \$8,000 annual operating expense of a
20 car; and

21 WHEREAS, Bicycling is quickly becoming more than just a
22 recreational activity. The number of United States commuters
23 using a bicycle as their primary mode of transportation in the
24 United States grew by more than 62 percent; now, therefore, be it

25 *Resolved by the Senate of the State of California, the Assembly*
26 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature hereby designates May
27 2016 as National Bike Month in California to celebrate the many
28 benefits of bicycling, to encourage Californians to ride bicycles
29 for commuting and recreation, and to urge local communities to
30 create bicycle-friendly policies and facilities; and be it further

31 *Resolved*, That the Secretary of the Senate transmit copies of
32 this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

- 6) The League of American Bicyclists estimates that Americans saved \$4.6 billion in 2012 by bicycling instead of driving an automobile, based on the annual operating expense of \$308 for a bicycle and an \$8,000 annual operating expense of a car.
