Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 141—Relative to Multiple Sclerosis Awareness Week.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

ACR 141, as amended, Wood. Multiple Sclerosis Awareness Week.

This measure would declare the week of March 7, 2016, through ~~March 13, 2015~~, *March 13, 2016*, as Multiple Sclerosis Awareness Week.

- 1 WHEREAS, The week of March 7, 2016, through March 13,
2 2016, has been declared Multiple Sclerosis Awareness Week in
3 recognition of the importance of finding the cause of, and a cure
4 for, *of and a cure for* multiple sclerosis and to express appreciation
5 to the National Multiple Sclerosis Society and its California
6 chapters; and
7 WHEREAS, Multiple sclerosis is a neurological disease of the
8 central nervous system that affects an estimated 400,000 Americans
9 across the country, and nearly 200 new cases are diagnosed each
10 week nationwide; and
11 WHEREAS, More than 40,000 people in California are affected
12 by this devastating disease; and

1 WHEREAS, Twice as many women as men have multiple
2 sclerosis and most are diagnosed between 20 and 50 years of age,
3 and while studies indicate genetic factors make certain individuals
4 more susceptible than others, there is no evidence that multiple
5 sclerosis is directly inherited; and

6 WHEREAS, The National Multiple Sclerosis Society, founded
7 in 1946, funds more research, offers more services for people with
8 multiple sclerosis, and provides more professional education
9 programs than any other multiple sclerosis organization in the
10 world. Through its 50-state network of chapters, the society serves
11 more than one million people annually; and

12 WHEREAS, The society is the largest private supporter of
13 multiple sclerosis research in the world, and for more than 55 years
14 it has funded innovative research and advocated for government
15 support of important scientific inquiries; and

16 WHEREAS, Throughout the years, the California chapters of
17 the society have been committed to heightening public knowledge
18 and insight, and are currently planning several major statewide
19 educational programs to raise awareness about the effects of
20 multiple sclerosis; now, therefore, be it

21 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
22 *thereof concurring,* That the Legislature declares the week of
23 March 7, 2016, through March 13, 2016, as Multiple Sclerosis
24 Awareness Week, and that the residents of the State of California
25 are encouraged to join together in raising awareness and
26 heightening public knowledge of this debilitating disease; and be
27 it further

- 1) Multiple Sclerosis is a neurological disease of the central nervous system that affects an estimated 400,000 Americans across the country; and, nearly 200 new cases are diagnosed each week nationwide.
- 2) Twice as many women as men have multiple sclerosis; and, most are diagnosed between the ages of 20 and 50 years of age.
- 3) The California chapters of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society report that more than 40,000 people in California are affected by this devastating disease.
- 4) The National Multiple Sclerosis Foundation, founded in 1946, funds more research, offers more services for people with the disease, and provides more professional education programs than any other multiple sclerosis organization; and through its 50-state network of chapters, the society serves more than one million people annually.

House Resolution No. 38—Relative to Season for Nonviolence.

1 WHEREAS, On a daily basis we are confronted by the challenge
2 of violence in the form of hate crimes, brutality, domestic abuse,
3 and other forms of inhumanity; and

4 WHEREAS, Violence takes a terrible physical, mental,
5 emotional, and financial toll on society; and

6 WHEREAS, Violence prevention and conflict resolution
7 programs in schools and communities throughout the nation and
8 world are positively affecting our families and our neighborhoods,
9 one day at a time; and

10 WHEREAS, Every person can move the world in the direction
11 of peace through his or her daily nonviolent choices and actions;
12 and

13 WHEREAS, An awareness of nonviolent principles and practices
14 is a powerful way to heal and transform our lives and communities,
15 to recognize the dignity and worth of every human being, and to
16 promote peace and harmony among all people regardless of race,
17 color, culture, class, language, faith, age, gender, sexual preference,
18 or other apparent difference; and

19 WHEREAS, The Season for Nonviolence, a national campaign
20 held January 30 to April 4, inclusive, to mark the memorial
21 anniversaries of noted nonviolent advocates Mahatma Gandhi and
22 Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., provides an opportunity to educate
23 citizens about nonviolence; and

1 WHEREAS, The annual 64-day campaign, cofounded in 1998
2 by Dr. Arun Gandhi and the Association for Global New Thought,
3 is an educational, media, and grassroots awareness campaign; and
4 WHEREAS, The purpose of the Season for Nonviolence is to
5 focus education and community action towards attaining peace
6 and justice in the spirit of Gandhi and King; and
7 WHEREAS, The Season for Nonviolence teaches that every
8 person can move the world forward in the direction of peace
9 through daily nonviolent choices and actions. Through media
10 attention, the Season for Nonviolence also recognizes and
11 celebrates those who are using nonviolence to build communities
12 that honor the dignity and worth of every human being; now,
13 therefore, be it
14 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California*, That the
15 Assembly proclaims January 30, 2016, to April 4, 2016, inclusive,
16 as the 19th annual Season for Nonviolence, and encourages all
17 citizens to participate in local, national, and global educational
18 and community campaigns to honor those who are using
19 nonviolence to build communities that respect the dignity and
20 worth of every human being; and be it further
21 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
