Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 36—Relative to California's regional occupational centers and programs.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 36, as introduced, O'Donnell. California's regional occupational centers and programs.

This measure would commemorate California's regional occupational centers and programs for over 50 years of service to students, industry, and communities.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, For the last 50 years, California's regional
2 occupational centers and programs (ROC/Ps) have been promoting
3 and supporting the regional delivery of exemplary career education,
4 career development, and workforce preparation that contributes
5 to student academic and career success and to the economic
6 development of California; and

7 WHEREAS, ROC/Ps provide students with valuable career
8 technical education (CTE) so those students can enter the workforce
9 with the skills and competencies needed to be successful, pursue
10 advanced training in postsecondary institutions, and upgrade their
11 existing skills and knowledge; and

12 WHEREAS, ROC/Ps have been operated by school districts,
13 consortia of districts operating under joint powers agreements, or
14 by county offices of education; and

1 WHEREAS, ROC/P courses may be offered during the regular
2 schoolday, before or after the regular schoolday, or during summer
3 or intersession breaks; and

4 WHEREAS, ROC/Ps have been a major factor in assisting
5 students to prepare for careers and college by offering CTE
6 pathways, access and equity for all students to participate in
7 real-world instruction, many courses that meet “A-G” admission
8 requirements, and courses that offer college credit through
9 articulation and dual enrollment opportunities; and

10 WHEREAS, ROC/Ps offer courses that are part of a sequence
11 of courses, that lead to an industry-recognized credential or
12 certificate, or appropriate postsecondary training or employment,
13 and that as much as possible meet “A-G” admissions requirements;
14 and

15 WHEREAS, A course in an ROC/P must do all of the following:

16 (a) Provide high-quality curriculum and instruction aligned with
17 state standards.

18 (b) Provide career exploration and guidance.

19 (c) Provide support and leadership development for pupils.

20 (d) Be guided by industry partnerships and advisory committees,
21 and build system alignment and coherence, including with
22 postsecondary institutions.

23 (e) Participate in a strong regional collaborative structure with
24 postsecondary institutions, business, labor, and other appropriate
25 community partners.

26 (f) Provide a broad range of work-based learning opportunities.

27 (g) Reflect labor market demands.

28 (h) Focus on current or emerging high-skill, high-wage, or
29 high-demand occupations.

30 (i) Be staffed by qualified, credentialed CTE teachers.

31 (j) Provide professional development to skilled faculty and staff.

32 (k) Provide CTE outreach and communication to its students,
33 families, and business partners in the region.

34 (l) Support data-based pupil evaluation, accountability, and
35 continuous improvement; and

36 WHEREAS, ROC/Ps have served as many as 500,000 students
37 each year during the last 50 years; and

38 WHEREAS, ROC/P students represent the full diversity of
39 California, both rural and urban communities, and all geographic
40 regions of the state; and

1 WHEREAS, Students who enroll in CTE classes are more likely
2 to graduate or transition into postsecondary opportunities at a
3 consistently higher rate than students who do not participate in
4 CTE learning opportunities; and

5 WHEREAS, California's private sector businesses have been
6 long-time supporters of California's ROC/Ps; and

7 WHEREAS, Business and industry representatives provide
8 subject matter expertise, serve on advisory boards, and support a
9 rigorous industry-approved curriculum; and

10 WHEREAS, ROC/Ps maintain ongoing relationships with
11 businesses who invest in ROC/P students' successes through an
12 array of work-based learning strategies, including providing
13 hands-on real-world experiences, internships, guest speakers, job
14 shadowing, and mentoring; and

15 WHEREAS, ROC/Ps have worked with and provided skilled
16 workers to thousands of private businesses and public enterprises
17 each year; and

18 WHEREAS, ROC/Ps employ thousands of highly qualified
19 CTE professionals, including teachers, administrators, counselors,
20 and support staff, all of whom benefit from a close professional
21 network and professional development opportunities; now,
22 therefore, be it

23 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
24 *thereof concurring,* That the Legislature commemorates
25 California's regional occupational centers and programs for over
26 50 years of service to students, industry, and communities; and be
27 it further

28 *Resolved,* That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
29 of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

ACR 70, as introduced, Choi. Secure Your Load Day.

This measure would declare June 6, 2021, as Secure Your Load Day in California.

1 WHEREAS, The State of California is the nation’s most
2 populous state with 38.8 million residents and growing; and

3 WHEREAS, Traffic in California has become more congested
4 in recent years, resulting in an increase in road debris and
5 automobile collisions; and

6 WHEREAS, Over 200,000 accidents and 500 traffic deaths
7 occurred in the United States between 2011 and 2014 due to
8 dangerous road debris from unsecured loads; and

9 WHEREAS, Ethan Hawks, a 17-year-old senior and football
10 star from Whittier Christian High School, was a victim of a tragic
11 accident in the County of Orange caused by a heavy piece of metal
12 escaping from another vehicle and striking the car that he was
13 riding in, ultimately taking his life; and

14 WHEREAS, All residents of California should recognize the
15 dangers of driving, and be accountable for their habits while in a
16 vehicle; and

1 WHEREAS, Section 23114 of the Vehicle Code prohibits a
2 vehicle from being driven on a highway unless it is constructed,
3 covered, or loaded so as to prevent any of its contents or load from
4 escaping from the vehicle; and

5 WHEREAS, The commonsense, routine act of securing every
6 load protects the lives of California residents, and this precaution

14 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature declares June 6, 2021, as
15 Secure Your Load Day in California to increase public awareness
16 of the necessity of securing loads on vehicles using the state's
17 highways; and be it further

18 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
19 of this resolution to the Director of Motor Vehicles and to the
20 author for appropriate distribution.

7 WHEREAS, Fishing and boating are cherished American
8 traditions, activities that promote family values and unity, as well
9 as wholesome recreation and outdoor lifestyles; and

10 WHEREAS, Approximately 141.6 million Americans go boating
11 each year, including 71.1 million adults and 70.5 million children;
12 and

13 WHEREAS, The recreational boating industry contributes
14 \$170.3 billion to the national economy in direct, indirect, and

1 induced spending, which supports over 35,000 businesses and
2 691,000 direct and indirect jobs in the United States; and

3 WHEREAS, Ninety-five percent of boats sold in the United
4 States are made in the United States, with approximately 1,300
5 active marine manufacturers in the United States, using materials
6 and services contributed from all 50 states; and

7 WHEREAS, There are 49 million total anglers in the United
8 States who help generate a total economic output of \$125 billion
9 and 802,000 jobs; and

10 WHEREAS, Anglers and boaters are stewards of the
11 environment, contributing \$1.6 billion in excise taxes annually to
12 the federal Sport Fish Restoration and Boating Trust Fund, which
13 funds habitat conservation and restoration efforts, preserving our
14 natural resources for future generations; and

15 WHEREAS, Sport fishing is vital to California's tourism
16 economy, with 2 million anglers spending \$2.9 billion while
17 fishing, supporting \$5.2 billion in economic output and 37,000
18 jobs; and

19 WHEREAS, Recreational boating is vital to the California
20 economy, with an annual impact of \$13 billion, including 41,125
21 jobs, 2,820 businesses, and 745,641 registered boats; and

22 WHEREAS, Recreational boating and angling has seen a
23 resurgence of interest during the COVID-19 pandemic as families
24 and individuals look for safe and responsible recreational outdoor
25 activities; now, therefore, be it

26 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
27 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature hereby proclaims the
28 week of June 5, 2021, through June 13, 2021, as California Fishing
29 and Boating Week; and be it further

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

ACR 87, as introduced, Gipson. National Gun Violence Awareness Day

This measure would proclaim June 4, 2021, as National Gun Violence Awareness Day.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, Every day, more than 100 Americans are killed
2 by gun violence alongside more than 230 who are shot and
3 wounded, and on average there are more than 14,000 gun
4 homicides every year; and

5 WHEREAS, Americans are 25 times more likely to die by gun
6 homicide than people in other high-income countries; and

7 WHEREAS, California has the 45th highest rate of gun deaths
8 in the United States, with over 3,000 gun deaths every year, a rate
9 of 7.6 deaths per 100,000 people; and

10 WHEREAS, In the City of Los Angeles, there were 350
11 homicides in 2020, nearly 100 more than in 2019, many of which
12 involved gun violence; and

13 WHEREAS, Protecting public safety in the communities they
14 serve is among a legislator’s greatest responsibilities; and

1 WHEREAS, Black and Latinx communities have borne the
2 heaviest burden of gun violence in cities for years; and

3 WHEREAS, Support for the Second Amendment rights of
4 law-abiding citizens goes hand-in-hand with keeping guns away
5 from people that shouldn't have them; and

6 WHEREAS, Acknowledging recent strides made by the Biden
7 Administration, there remains a need for greater focus on gun
8 violence prevention within our communities; and

9 WHEREAS, Gun violence prevention is more important than
10 ever as the COVID-19 pandemic continues to exacerbate gun
11 violence after more than a year of increased gun sales, increased
12 calls to suicide and domestic violence hotlines, and an increase in
13 city gun violence; and

14 WHEREAS, In January 2013, 15 year old Hadiya Pendleton
15 was tragically shot and killed, and on June 4, 2021, to recognize
16 the 24th birthday of Hadiya Pendleton, people across the United
17 States will recognize National Gun Violence Awareness Day and
18 wear orange in tribute to Hadiya, other victims of gun violence,
19 and their loved ones; and

20 WHEREAS, The idea was inspired by a group of Hadiya's
21 friends, who asked their classmates to commemorate her life by
22 wearing orange because hunters wear orange to announce
23 themselves to other hunters when out in the woods and orange is
24 a color that symbolizes the value of human life; and

25 WHEREAS, Anyone can join this campaign by pledging to
26 wear orange on June 4, the first Friday in June in 2021, to help
27 raise awareness about gun violence; and

28 WHEREAS, By wearing orange on June 4, 2021, Americans
29 will raise awareness about gun violence and honor the lives of gun
30 violence victims and survivors; now, therefore, be it

31 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
32 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature declares the first Friday
33 in June, June 4, 2021, to be National Gun Violence Awareness
34 Day; and be it further

35 *Resolved*, That the Legislature renews their commitment to
36 reduce gun violence and pledges to do all that can be done to keep
37 firearms out of the wrong hands and to encourage responsible gun
38 ownership to help keep our children safe; and be it further

- 1 *Resolved*, That the Legislature encourages all citizens to support
- 2 their communities' efforts to prevent the tragic effects of gun
- 3 violence and to honor and value human lives; and be it further
- 4 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
- 5 of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

SUBJECT: National Gun Violence Awareness Day

SUMMARY: Proclaims June 4, 2021, as National Gun Violence Awareness Day and encourages all citizens to support their communities' efforts to prevent the tragic effects of gun violence and to honor and value human lives. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) Every day, more than 100 Americans are killed by gun violence alongside more than 230 who are shot and wounded, and on average there are more than 14,000 gun homicides every year. Americans are 25 times more likely to die by gun homicide than people in other high-income countries.
- 2) California has the 45th highest rate of gun deaths in the United States, with over 3,000 gun deaths every year, a rate of 7.6 deaths per 100,000 people.
- 3) Gun violence prevention is more important than ever as the COVID-19 pandemic continues to exacerbate gun violence after more than a year of increased gun sales, increased calls to suicide and domestic violence hotlines, and an increase in city gun violence.
- 4) In January 2013, 15-year-old Hadiya Pendleton was tragically shot and killed, and on June 4, 2021, to recognize the 24th birthday of Hadiya Pendleton, people across the United States will recognize National Gun Violence Awareness Day and wear orange in tribute to Hadiya, other victims of gun violence, and their loved ones.
- 5) The idea was inspired by a group of Hadiya's friends, who asked their classmates to commemorate her life by wearing orange because hunters wear orange to announce themselves to other hunters when out in the woods and orange is a color that symbolizes the value of human life.
- 6) By wearing orange on June 4, 2021, Americans will raise awareness about gun violence and honor the lives of gun violence victims and survivors.
