7 campaign with the slogan Science Matters to educate the public

8 and policy makers about the important work state scientists perform

9 to protect the public from life-threatening diseases, safeguard our10 wildlife and abundant natural resources, and protect our air and

11 water from toxic waste and pollution; and

WHEREAS, CAPS cosponsors the Sacramento Regional Science
and Engineering Fair, one of California's 14 regional science and
engineering fairs, serving hundreds of middle and high schools in
10 California counties; and

WHEREAS, State scientists host an annual State Scientist Day at the State Capitol to increase public awareness and recognition of the significant contributions made by scientists working in state government while entertaining and educating over 3,500 elementary school students with fun, hands-on science exhibits; and

This measure would recognize the month of May-2017 2018 as Arthritis Awareness Month.

1 WHEREAS, Arthritis includes more than 100 rheumatic diseases

2 and conditions that affect joints, tissues that surround joints, and3 other connective tissue; and

4 WHEREAS, Arthritis is a chronic health problem that is the 5 nation's leading cause of physical disability among Americans 6 and is most common among people with multiple chronic 7 conditions; and

8 WHEREAS, Arthritis causes pain and loss of movement, can 9 limit everyday activities such as walking and dressing, and can 10 even lead to death; and

11 WHEREAS, Arthritis affects an estimated 52.5 million American

12 adults living with some form of doctor-diagnosed arthritis,

13 representing 22.7 percent of adults in the United States; and

14 WHEREAS, An estimated 300,000 children under 18 years of 15 age have a form of arthritis or rheumatic condition, representing

16 approximately 1 in every 250 children in the United States; and

1 WHEREAS, Arthritis costs the United States economy more

2 than \$128 billion each year, \$81 billion in direct medical care costs

3 and \$47 billion in indirect costs; and

4 WHEREAS, In California, arthritis costs our state \$11.5 billion 5 annually; and

6 WHEREAS, In California, there are more than 5.9 5.7 million
7 people living with arthritis, including 38,000 children; and

8 WHEREAS, In California, 43 percent of adults with diabetes 9 also have arthritis, 52 percent of adults with cardiovascular disease 10 also have arthritis, and 38 percent of adults with high blood 11 pressure also have arthritis; and

12 WHEREAS, Among working age adults with arthritis in 13 California, 43 percent have some work limitations due to their 14 arthritis; and

15 WHEREAS, One out of every three United States veterans lives

16 with arthritis and it is the top cause of disability among veterans.

17 Research supporting better prevention strategies, interventions,

18 and treatments is crucial to reducing the number of soldiers and

19 veterans suffering from arthritis; and

WHEREAS, An estimated 67 million adults 18 years of age and
older will have doctor-diagnosed arthritis by the year 2030; now,
therefore, be it

SUBJECT: Arthritis Awareness Month

**SUMMARY:** Proclaims the month of May 2018 as Arthritis Awareness Month. Specifically, **this resolution** makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) Arthritis includes more than 100 rheumatic diseases and conditions that affect joints, tissues that surround joints, and other connective tissue; and, is the nation's leading cause of physical disability among Americans and is most common among people with multiple chronic conditions.
- 2) Arthritis affects an estimated 52.5 million American adults living with some form of doctordiagnosed arthritis, representing 22.7 percent of adults in the United States.
- 3) An estimated 300,000 children under 18 years of age have a form of arthritis or rheumatic condition, representing approximately 1 in every 250 children in the United States.
- 4) In California there are more than 5.7 million people living with arthritis, including 38,000 children which costs our state \$11.5 billion annually.
- 5) Among working adults with arthritis in California, 43 percent have some work limitations due to their arthritis.
- 6) One out of every three United States veterans lives with arthritis and it is the top cause of disability among veterans. Research supporting better preventative strategies, interventions, and treatments is crucial to reducing the number of soldiers and veterans suffering from arthritis.
- 7) It is estimated that 67 million adults 18 years of age and older will have doctor-diagnosed arthritis by the year 2030.
