ASSEMBLY BILL

No. 2704

Introduced by Assembly Member Gipson (Coauthors: Assembly Members Brown, Burke, Cooper, Holden, Jones-Sawyer, McCarty, Thurmond, and Weber)

(Coauthors: Senators Hall and Mitchell)

February 19, 2016

An act to add Section 14633 to the Government Code, relating to the State Capitol.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2704, as amended, Gipson. State Capitol: Mervyn Dymally bust. Existing law prescribes various duties for the Department of General Services in connection with development and maintenance of the park around the State Capitol Building.

This bill would authorize the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation, upon establishment, in consultation with the Department of General Services, to plan a bust of Mervyn Dymally to be placed in the State Capitol Building Annex. The bill would require the Department of General Services and the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation to approve the design and any other aspect of the bust. The bill would require that the planning, construction, and maintenance of the bust be funded with private donations through the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation. The bill would prohibit construction of the bust until the Joint Committee on Rules has approved and adopted the plan for the bust, and the Joint Committee on Rules and the Department of Finance have determined that sufficient private funding

is available to construct and maintain the bust. The bill would provide legislative findings in support of these provisions.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- SECTION 1. The Legislature finds and declares all of the 1 2 following:
- 3 (a) The late Honorable Mervyn M. Dymally was born in Trinidad on May 12, 1926. Mr. Dymally moved to California when
- he was 19 years old, after spending time studying journalism in
- Missouri. His work organizing African American and low-income
- communities in Los Angeles earned him an election to the
- California State Assembly in 1962 where he became the first
- foreign-born person of African descent to ever hold a state office 9

- 11 (b) Mr. Dymally later went on to become the first African 12 American elected to the California State Senate, in 1966, and in
- 1974 became the state's first African American lieutenant 13

- the California Assembly to finish his political career. In California, 16

SECTION 1. Section 14632 is added to the Government Code, to read:

14632.

- 4 SEC. 2. Section 14633 is added to the Government Code, to 5 read:
 - 14633. (a) The Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation, upon establishment, may, in consultation with the Department of General Services, plan a bust of Mervyn Dymally to be placed in the State Capitol Building Annex.
 - (b) The Department of General Services, in consultation with the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation, shall accomplish the following goals:
 - (1) Review the preliminary design plans to identify potential maintenance concerns.
 - (2) Ensure Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (42 U.S.C. Sec. 12101 et seq.) compliance and other safety concerns.
 - (3) Review and approve proper California Environmental Quality Act (Division 13 (commencing with Section 21000) of the Public Resources Code) documents prepared for work at the designated historic property.
 - (4) Review final construction documents to ensure that all requirements are met.
 - (5) Prepare the right-of-entry permit outlining the final area of work, final construction documents, construction plans, the contractor hired to perform the work, insurance, bonding, provisions for damage to state property, and inspection requirements.
 - (6) Prepare a maintenance agreement outlining the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation's responsibility for the long-term maintenance of the bust due to aging, vandalism, or relocation.
 - (7) Inspect the construction performed by the contractor selected by the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation.
 - (c) If the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation undertakes responsibility to construct a bust under this section, it shall, in consultation with the Department of General Services, establish a schedule for the design, construction, and dedication of the bust, implement procedures to solicit designs for the bust, devise a selection process for the choice of the design, and establish a program for the dedication of the bust.

AB 2704 — 4 —

(d) The Department of General Services and the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation shall approve the design and any other aspect of the bust.

- (e) If the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation undertakes responsibility to construct a bust under this section, it shall not begin construction of the bust until the Joint Committee on Rules has approved and adopted the plan for the bust, and only if the Joint Committee on Rules and the Department of Finance have determined that sufficient private funding is available to construct and maintain the bust.
- (f) The planning, construction, and maintenance of the bust shall be funded exclusively through private donations to the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation.
- (g) If the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation undertakes responsibility to construct a bust under this section, it shall sign a maintenance agreement with the state, as created under paragraph (6) of subdivision (b), to maintain the bust with private contributions.

AB 2704 (Gipson) – As Amended April 26, 2016

SUBJECT: State Capitol: Mervyn Dymally bust

SUMMARY: Authorizes the construction and maintenance of a bust in the State Capitol Building Annex to honor Mervyn M. Dymally. Specifically, this bill:

- 1) Requires the Department of General Services (DGS) in consultation with the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation to be responsible for the planning, construction, and dedication of a bust to honor Mervyn Dymally.
- 2) Requires funds for the planning, construction, and maintenance of the bust be provided through private donations to the Mervyn Dymally Memorial Capitol Foundation.
- 3) Prohibits construction of the bust until the Joint Committee on Rules has approved and adopted the plan, and the Joint Committee on Rules and the Department of Finance have determined that sufficient private funding is available to construct and maintain the bust.

EXISTING LAW:

- 1) Requires DGS to oversee the buildings and grounds of the state, including the historic State Capitol and the State Capitol Building Annex.
- 2) Requires the Joint Committee on Rules to approve and adopt plans for memorials in the State Capitol Park and statues in the State Capitol Building Annex.

FISCAL EFFECT: Unknown

COMMENTS:

- 1) Purpose of the bill: According to the author, placing a bust in the State Capitol will memorialize Mervyn Dymally as the first African American Lieutenant Governor in California and commemorate his legacy of public service to this state. This bust will serve to inspire African Americans and all Californians as a model of community and political leadership.
- 2) Background: Mervyn Dymally was born in Cedros, Trinidad and moved to California when he was 19 years old. Mr. Dymally was elected to the California State Assembly in 1962, becoming the first foreign-born person of African descent to ever hold a state office in California, and served until 1966. He then served in the California State Senate from 1966 to 1974. Mervyn Dymally served as Lieutenant Governor from 1975-1979, and was California's first African American to hold this statewide office. Mr. Dymally continued his public service as a United States Congressman for 12 years from 1981-1993. He finished his political career in the California State Assembly, serving six years from 2002-2008.

Mr. Dymally is widely recognized as a significant and effective figure in California politics. In fact, throughout his career of public service he was considered the "Dean of Black Politicians."

- 3) Other Bust Locations: A bust of Mervyn Dymally is currently located at the following locations: Charles R. Drew University Dymally School of Nursing; CSU Dominguez Hills, Mervyn M. Dymally African American Political and Economic Institute; Cedros, Trinidad; the African American Museum of California; and, the National African American Museum in Washington D.C.
- 4) <u>Location in the Capitol</u>: AB 2704 does not specify where the bust would be placed in the State Capitol Building Annex. The author has indicated a desire to have it placed in or near the Lieutenant Governor's Office. The location will need final approval from DGS and the Joint Committee on Rules.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 175, as introduced, Achadjian. Viral Hepatitis Awareness Day. This measure would proclaim May 19, 2016, as Viral Hepatitis Awareness Day in California.

Fiscal committee: no.

- WHEREAS, Liver cancer and liver disease related to hepatitis
 B and C are two of the leading killers in California; and
- WHEREAS, Hepatitis C is the most prevalent bloodborne disease in the United States and in California; and
- WHEREAS, Early detection of hepatitis B and C infections promotes effective management or treatment of these infections, preventing disability, loss of productivity and income, and allowing
- people to live full, satisfying, and productive lives; and
- 9 WHEREAS, An undetected and untreated hepatitis B or C infection can lead to disability or death; and
- WHEREAS, The majority of the estimated 750,000 Californians
- with chronic hepatitis C infection do not know they are infected,
- and are therefore at high risk of severe liver disease, liver cancer,
- 14 or liver failure; and
- WHEREAS, The majority of the estimated 350,000 California
- 16 residents with hepatitis B infection do not know they are infected,

and are therefore at high risk of severe liver disease, liver cancer,

WHEREAS, Untreated hepatitis B and C infections are the leading causes of liver failure requiring liver transplant; and

WHEREAS, The federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention released updated guidelines calling for baby boomers – everyone born between 1945 and 1965 – to receive a one-time hepatitis C test, which would save over 100,000 lives; and

WHEREAS, In 2013, the United States Preventive Services Task Force (USPSTF) issued a Grade B rating for screening for hepatitis C virus (HCV) infection in persons at high risk for infection and adults born between 1945 and 1965; and

WHEREAS, Baby boomers make up 30 percent of California's adult population, and African American baby boomers are twice as likely to have hepatitis C as other baby boomers; and

WHEREAS, In 2009, the USPSTF issued a Grade A rating for screening pregnant women for the hepatitis B virus (HBV) infection during their first prenatal visit; and

WHEREAS, In 2014, the USPSTF issued a Grade B rating for screening people born in countries where hepatitis B is common, United States-born people who were not vaccinated against hepatitis B when they were babies and whose parents come from countries where hepatitis B is common, and other people at risk for hepatitis B; and

WHEREAS, There is a vaccine for the prevention of hepatitis B – the first proven, low-cost vaccination against any form of cancer made available to Americans; and

WHEREAS, Hepatitis B is most prevalent among people of Asian and Pacific Islander descent, and one-third of Americans of Asian and Pacific Islander descent live in California; and

WHEREAS, Hepatitis B-related and hepatitis C-related hospitalization charges totaled \$2.3 billion in 2010 in California, mostly paid for by tax-supported public health insurers; and

WHEREAS, New medications can cure hepatitis C in over 90 percent of people who are linked to and retained in care and treatment; and

WHEREAS, Hepatitis B can be treated effectively with proper medical management and may be curable in the near future; and -3- ACR 175

WHEREAS, The Legislature will continue to work to increase the affordability of, and access to, care, treatment, and cures for hepatitis; and

WHEREAS, Hepatitis awareness education campaigns and accessible screening for hepatitis B and C, along with appropriate treatment, can reduce the damage from hepatitis B and C viral infection to individuals and to our community, financially, as well as physically and emotionally; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate thereof concurring, That the Legislature hereby proclaims May 19, 2016, as Viral Hepatitis Awareness Day; and be it further

Resolved, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

SUBJECT: Viral Hepatitis Awareness Day
