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1 WHEREAS, The work of Blue Star Mothers of America, Inc., 2 includes providing support for active duty service personnel and 3 their families, promoting patriotism, and assisting various veteran 4 organizations, such as the American Gold Star Mothers, Inc.; and WHEREAS, The work of the Blue Star Mothers of America, 5 6 Inc., is increasingly important with the hundreds of thousands of United States Armed Forces men and women who have served in 7 8 Operation Enduring Freedom, Operation Iraqi Freedom, the global 9 war on terrorism, and with the continued deployments of the 10 California National Guard and our active duty military and its reserve components; and 11 12 WHEREAS, The dedication, sacrifice, and hard work of the 13 devoted members of the Blue Stars Mothers of America, Inc., merit 14 recognition; and 15 WHEREAS, The Blue Star Flag is the official banner authorized by the Department of Defense for display by families who have 16 members serving in the United States Armed Forces during a period 17 18 of war or armed conflict in which the nation may be engaged in 19 for the duration of such hostilities: and WHEREAS, The Blue Star Flag was designed and patented by 20 World War I Army Captain Robert L. Queisser of the 5th Ohio 21 22 Infantry who had two sons serving on the front lines and the flag 23 quickly became an unofficial symbol of a child in service; now, 24 therefore, be it 25 Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate thereof concurring.
