SUBJECT: Mathematics Awareness Month.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: Proclaims April 2014 as Mathematics Awareness Month and would, among other things, encourage colleges, universities, and other organizations to hold events to celebrate Mathematics Awareness Month. Specifically, <u>this resolution</u> makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) Mathematics Awareness Month began in 1986 when President Ronald Reagan issued a proclamation for National Awareness Week; and, April 2014 will be recognized as Mathematics Awareness Month.
- 2) Engagement with and education in mathematics are key to preparing students for careers in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) fields.
- 3) The theme of Mathematics Awareness Month 2014, "Mathematics, Magic, and Mystery," honors the centennial of the birth of renowned mathematics popularizer Martin Gardner, whose extensive writings inspired enthusiasts of all ages to engage deeply with or even pursue a career in mathematics.
- 4) A study done in 2011 by the United States Department of Commerce, Economics and Statistics Administration states that although women make up close to half the jobs in the United States economy, they make up only 24 percent of the STEM workforce, so encouraging women and members of underrepresented groups to join the STEM workforce in proportion to their representation in the overall labor force will help to ease the STEM worker shortage.

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 125—Relative to organ donation.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 125, as introduced, John A. Pérez. Donate Life California Day: driver's license.

This measure would designate April 7, 2014, as DMV/Donate Life California Day in the State of California and the month of April 2014, as DMV/Donate Life California Month in the State of California, and would encourage all Californians to sign up with the Donate Life California Organ and Tissue Donor Registry.

Fiscal committee: no.

- WHEREAS, Organ, tissue, eye, and blood donation are compassionate and life-giving acts looked upon and recognized in the highest regard; and
- WHEREAS, More than 121,000 individuals nationwide and over 21,000 Californians are currently on the national organ transplant wait list. While about one-third of these patients receive a transplant each year, another one-third die while waiting due to a shortage of donated organs; and
- 9 WHEREAS, A single individual's donation of heart, lungs, 10 liver, kidneys, pancreas, and small intestine can save up to eight lives. The donation of tissue can save and enhance the lives of up

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1 to 50 others, and a single blood donation can help three people in 2 need; and

WHEREAS, Millions of lives each year are saved and enhanced by donors of organs, tissue, eyes, and blood; and

WHEREAS, Californians by the millions are joining together to save and enhance lives by becoming registered donors. Nearly eleven million Californians have signed up with the state-authorized Donate Life California Organ and Tissue Donor Registry to ensure that their wishes to be an organ, eye, and tissue donor are honored; and

WHEREAS, A California resident can register with the Donate Life California Registry when applying for or renewing his or her driver's license or identification card at the Department of Motor Vehicles; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate thereof concurring, That in recognition of April as National Donate Life Month, the Legislature proclaims April 7, 2014, as DMV/Donate Life California Day in the State of California, and April 2014 as DMV/Donate Life California Month in the State of California. In doing so, the Legislature encourages all Californians to check "YES" when applying for or renewing a driver's license or identification card, or by signing up at www.donatelifecalifornia.org or www.donevidacalifornia.org; and be it further

ACR 125 (John A. Pérez) – As Introduced: March 28, 2014

SUBJECT: Donate Life California Day: driver's license.

<u>SUMMARY</u>: Designates April 7, 2014, as DMV/Donate Life California Day in the state of California and the month of April 2014, as DMV/Donate Life California Month in the State of California, and would encourage all Californians to sign up with the Donate Life California Organ and Tissue Donor Registry. Specifically, <u>this resolution</u> makes the following legislative findings:

- 1) Organ, tissue, eye, and blood donation are compassionate and life-giving acts looked upon and recognized in the highest regard; and a single individual's donation of heart, lungs, liver, kidneys, pancreas, and small intestine can save up to eight lives. A donation of tissue can save and enhance up to 50 others, and a single blood donation can help three people.
- 2) There are more than 121,000 individuals nationwide and over 21,000 Californians currently on the national organ transplant wait list and while about one-third of these patients receive a transplant each year, another one-third die while waiting due to a shortage of donated organs.
- 3) Californians by the millions are joining together to save and enhance lives by becoming registered donors.

An act to amend Section 34191.3 of the Health and Safety Code, relating to redevelopment.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1963, as introduced, Atkins. Redevelopment.

The Community Redevelopment Law authorized the establishment of redevelopment agencies in communities to address the effects of blight, as defined. Existing law dissolved redevelopment agencies as of February 1, 2012, and provides for the designation of successor agencies, as defined. Existing law requires successor agencies to wind down the affairs of the dissolved redevelopment agencies, subject to review by oversight boards. The oversight board is required to direct a successor agency to, and a successor agency is required to, among other things, dispose of assets and properties of the former redevelopment agency as directed by the oversight board. Existing law suspends this requirement, except as it applies to the transfer or assets and properties for governmental use, until the Department of Finance has approved a long-range property management plan, as specified. Upon approval of a long-range property management plan, the plan governs and supersedes, all other provisions relating to the disposition and use of the real property assets of the former redevelopment agency. If the department has not approved a long-range property management plan by January 1, 2015, existing law requires the property of a former redevelopment agency to be disposed of according to law.

AB 1963 -2-

This bill would eliminate this latter requirement that would apply the earlier provisions to the disposal of the assets and properties of a former redevelopment agency.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- SECTION 1. Section 34191.3 of the Health and Safety Code is amended to read:
- 34191.3. Notwithstanding Section 34191.1, the requirements
- 4 specified in subdivision (e) of Section 34177 and subdivision (a)
- 5 of Section 34181 shall be suspended, except as those provisions
- 6 apply to the transfers for governmental use, until the Department
- 7 of Finance has approved a long-range property management plan
- 8 pursuant to subdivision (b) of Section 34191.5, at which point the
- 9 plan shall govern, and supersede all other provisions relating to.
- the disposition and use of the real property assets of the former
- to the disposition and use of the real property assets of the former
- 11 redevelopment agency. If the department has not approved a plan
- 12 by January 1, 2015, subdivision (e) of Section 34177 and
- 13 subdivision (a) of Section 34181 shall be operative with respect
- 14 to that successor agency.

Re: Approval of Urgency Clause – AB 1963 (Atkins and Dickinson)

Dear Chair Gordon:

I respectfully request approval to amend an urgency clause into AB 1963, relating to redevelopment.

AB 1963 extends the date by which long range property management plans submitted by redevelopment successor agencies must be approved by the Department of Finance. Currently those plans must be approved by January 1, 2015. If they are not approved by that date, agency properties must be sold quickly, potentially leading to "fire sales" of assets that will impair important local economic development efforts. It now appears likely that the Department and local agencies will not be able to complete the approval process by the end of this year. I am requesting an urgency clause in order to assure local governments that additional time will be provided to gain approval of long range property management plans.
