ACR 138, as introduced, Achadjian. Viral Hepatitis Awareness Day. This measure would proclaim May 19, 2014, as Viral Hepatitis Awareness Day in California.

- 1 WHEREAS, Liver cancer and liver disease related to hepatitis
- 2 B and C are two of the leading killers in California; and

7 WHEREAS, The federal Centers for Disease Control and

8 Prevention released updated guidelines calling for everyone born
9 between 1945 and 1965 to receive a one-time hepatitis C test,

10 which would save over 100.000 lives; and

11 WHEREAS, In 2013, the United States Preventive Services

12 Task Force (USPSTF) issued a Grade B rating for screening for 13 hepatitis C virus (HCV) infection in persons at high risk for

14 infection and adults born between 1945 and 1965; and

WHEREAS, In 2009, the USPSTF issued a Grade A rating for screening pregnant women for the hepatitis B virus (HBV) during

Senate Joint Resolution No. 21—Relative to the Armenian Genocide.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SJR 21, as introduced, De León. Armenian Genocide.

This measure would designate and encourage the people of California to commemorate the month of April 2014, as "California Month of Remembrance for the Armenian Genocide of 1915–1923," and would call upon the Congress and the President of the United States to act likewise and to formally and consistently recognize and reaffirm the historical truth that the atrocities committed against the Armenian people constituted genocide. The measure would commend conscientious educators who teach about human rights and genocide. The measure would call upon the President to work toward equitable, constructive, stable, and durable Armenian-Turkish relations and a fair, just, and comprehensive international resolution of this crime against humanity, and would call upon the Republic of Turkey to acknowledge the facts of the Armenian Genocide and to work toward a just resolution.

1 WHEREAS, During the Armenian Genocide of 1915–1923 1.5

2 million men, women, and children of Armenian descent lost their

3 lives at the hands of the Ottoman Turkish Empire in its attempt to

- 4 systematically eliminate the Armenian race; and
- 5 WHEREAS, Despite Armenians' historic presence, stewardship,
- 6 and autonomy in the region, Turkish rulers of the Ottoman Empire

1 subjected Armenians to severe and unjust persecution and brutality

2 including, but not limited to, widespread and wholesale massacres

3 beginning in the 1890's, most notably the Hamidian Massacres

4 from 1894 to 1896 and the Adana Massacre of 1909; and

5 WHEREAS, The earlier massacres and subsequent genocide of 6 the Armenians constitute one of the most atrocious violations of 7 human rights in the history of the world, and

8 WHEREAS, Adolph Hitler, in persuading his army commanders

9 that the merciless persecution and killing of Jews, Poles, and other

10 people would bring no retribution, declared, "Who, after all, speaks 11 today of the annihilation of the Armenians?": and

12 WHEREAS, Unlike other people and governments that have 13 admitted and denounced the abuses and crimes of predecessor regimes, and despite the overwhelming proof of genocidal intent, 14 15 the Republic of Turkey has inexplicably and adamantly denied the 16 occurrence of the crimes against humanity committed by the 17 Ottoman and Young Turk rulers. Those denials compound the 18 grief of the few remaining survivors of the atrocities, desecrate 19 the memory of the victims, and cause continuing pain to the

20 descendants of the victims; and

WHEREAS, The Republic of Turkey has escalated its
international campaign of Armenian Genocide denial, maintained
its blockade of Armenia and increased its pressure on the small

24 but growing movement in Turkey acknowledging the Armenian

25 Genocide and seeking justice for this systematic campaign of

destruction of millions of Armenians, Greeks, Assyrians, Pontians,Syriacs, and other Christians upon their biblical-era homelands;

WHEREAS, This measure would declare that the Legislature deplores the persistent, ongoing efforts by any person, in this country or abroad, to deny the historical fact of the Armenian Genocide; and

- 1) During the Armenian Genocide of 1915-1923, 1.5 million men, women, and children of Armenian descent lost their lives at the hands of the Ottoman Turkish Empire.
- 2) The United States is on record as having officially recognized the Armenian Genocide in the U.S. government's May 28, 1951, written statement to the International Court of Justice regarding the Reservations to the Convention on the Prevention and Punishment of the Crime of Genocide, through President Ronald Reagan's April 22, 1981, Proclamation No. 4838, and by Congressional legislation including House Joint Resolution 148 adopted on April 8, 1975, and House Joint Resolution 247 adopted on September 10, 1984.
- 3) California is home to the largest Armenian-American population in the United States, and Armenians living in California have enriched our state through their leadership and contribution in business, agriculture, academia, government, and the arts.
- 4) The State of California has been at the forefront of encouraging and promoting a curriculum relating to human rights and genocide in order to empower future generations to prevent the recurrence of genocide.

CALIFORNIA LEGISLATURE-2013-14 REGULAR SESSION

ASSEMBLY BILL

No. 2517

Introduced by Assembly Member Daly (Coauthors: Assembly Members Brown and Fox) (Coauthor: Senator Hueso)

February 21, 2014

An act to amend Section-8604 of the Revenue and Taxation 7069 of *the Government* Code, relating to taxation.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2517, as amended, Daly. Use Fuel Tax Law. Economic development: taxation: credits: certifications.

The Personal Income Tax Law and the Corporation Tax Law authorize various credits against the taxes imposed by those laws, including a hiring credit for qualified taxpayers who hire qualified employees, as defined, within enterprise zones and local agency military base recovery areas, subject to specified criteria and requirements. Those laws require that a taxpayer obtain a certification from the Employment Development Department, as permitted by federal law, the local county or city Job Training Partnership Act administrative entity, the local county GAIN office or social services agency, or the local government administering a specified area or zone that provides that a qualified employee meets the specified eligibility requirements. Existing law authorizes any local entity formerly authorized to issue a certification that provides that a qualified employee, qualified disadvantaged individual, or qualified displaced employee meets specified eligibility requirements, to continue to accept applications for certification and to issue the certifications up to but no later than January 1, 2015.

This bill would instead provide for those local entities to continue to accept applications for the certification up to but no later than January 1, 2015, and would remove the provision that local entities issue the certifications up to but no later than January 1, 2015.

The Use Fuel Tax Law imposes a tax, at specified rates, on the use of specified fuels, including natural gas, liquified petroleum gas, and ethanol or methanol on the highways of the state. The term "fuel" is defined for purposes of that law.

This bill would make technical, nonsubstantive changes to that definition.

11 under Section 17053.34, 17053.46, 17053.47, 17053.74, 23622.7,

12 23622.8, 23634, or 23646 of the Revenue and Taxation Code may

13 *shall* continue to accept applications for the certification and to

Dear Assemblymember Gordon:

I respectively request to add an urgency clause to AB 2517, a bill I have authored this legislative session to give California businesses an opportunity to claim Enterprise Zone (EZ) hiring credits.

Current state law requires employers qualifying for EZ credits for hiring individuals from among several categories to be issued a voucher by December 31 of this year.

Unfortunately, that deadline is forcing local governments to establish early deadlines for submission of documentation required to obtain hiring vouchers from local jurisdictions. For instance, one city has set a deadline of April 30th of this year for employers to remit proper documentation.

An urgency clause placed on AB 2517 will give business owners that had hired eligible employees by the December 31, 2013 deadline a fair opportunity to claim hiring credits to which they are entitled to.
