LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

ACR 190, as introduced, Waldron. HIV Testing Day.

This measure would proclaim June 27, 2016, as HIV Testing Day in California and would encourage Californians to learn their HIV status.

1 WHEREAS, In 2014, the State Department of Public Health
2 reported 5,551 new HIV diagnoses in California; and
3 WHEREAS, As of June 30, 2014, the cumulative number of
4 HIV-positive cases in California reached 50,955, and the
5 cumulative number of HIV/AIDS cases reached 169,588; and
6 WHEREAS, As of June 30, 2014, Whites represented 50.4
7 percent of all cumulative HIV-positive and HIV/AIDS cases in
8 California, Hispanics represented 27.2 percent, Blacks represented
9 17.7 percent, and Asians/Pacific Islanders represented 3 percent;
10 and
11 WHEREAS, From 2009 to 2014, inclusive, the proportion of
12 Latinos and Asians/Pacific Islanders in California who made up
13 new HIV diagnoses increased; and
14 WHEREAS, In California, African Americans are
15 disproportionately represented among those diagnosed with HIV;
16 and

1 WHEREAS, In 2014, five states, including California, made up
2 almost half of all new HIV diagnoses in the United States; and

3 WHEREAS, More than 1.2 million people in the United States
4 are living with an HIV infection, and that number grows by almost
5 50,000 each year; and

6 WHEREAS, One in seven people with HIV do not know that
7 they are infected, and three in 10 new HIV infections in the United
8 States are transmitted by people who do not know that they are
9 infected; and

10 WHEREAS, More than 90 percent of new HIV infections in
11 the United States could be prevented by testing and diagnosing
12 people who have HIV and ensuring that they receive prompt and
13 ongoing care and treatment; and

14 WHEREAS, National HIV Testing Day is held on June 27,
15 2016, and should serve as an opportunity to raise awareness about
16 the importance of HIV testing and early diagnosis of HIV; now,
17 therefore be it

18 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
19 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature recognizes the importance
20 of getting tested for HIV; and be it further

21 *Resolved*, That the Legislature proclaims June 27, 2016, as HIV
22 Testing Day in California and encourages Californians to get the
23 facts and to learn their HIV status; and be it further

- 2) One in seven people with HIV do not know that they are infected, and three in 10 new HIV infections in the United States are transmitted by people who do not know that they are infected.
- 3) More than 90 percent of new HIV infections in the United States could be prevented by testing and diagnosing people who have HIV and ensuring that they receive prompt and ongoing care and treatment.
- 4) National HIV Testing Day is held on June 27, 2016, and should serve as an opportunity to raise awareness about the importance of HIV testing and early diagnosis of HIV.

RE: ACR 190 Relative to HIV Testing Day--SUPPORT

Dear Assemblymember Gordon and Members of the Rules Committee

On behalf of CLSA's more than 750 members spanning the biotechnology, pharmaceutical, medical device sectors of healthcare, as well as California's academic and research institutions, I am writing to thank you both for introducing ACR 190, proclaiming June 27, 2016 as HIV Testing Day, and bringing awareness to the importance of HIV testing in California.

Every year, roughly 4,700 individuals are diagnosed with HIV in California. In 2013, 5,315 adults and adolescents were newly diagnosed and California ranked second among fifty states in the highest number of newly HIV diagnoses. More than 1.2 million people in the United States are living with an HIV infection with an increase of almost 50,000 each year. One in seven people are unaware of their infection and three in ten new HIV infections are transmitted by people who do not know they are infected. However, more than 90 percent of new HIV infections could be prevented in the United States with testing and diagnosis.

Recent discussions to reduce the number of HIV cases have led to preventative medications including pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) and post-exposure prophylaxis (PeP). These medications are HIV prevention interventions that reduce transmission of HIV and prevent new infections in at-risk HIV-negative individuals. Many studies have shown that proper use of these medications have led up to 80%-96% success rates in preventing HIV infection.

As an industry that continues to find cures and is committed to saving lives, we believe that it is critical to raise HIV awareness, especially among high-risk populations, and encourage individuals to receive early diagnosis and prompt ongoing care.

For these reasons, we are pleased to support ACR 190, a day in which we encourage more Californians to learn about their HIV status.

House Resolution No. 54—Relative to Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender (LGBT) Pride Month.

1 WHEREAS, Our great state and nation strive to promote the
2 principles of equality and justice and the inalienable rights of all
3 people to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness; and
4 WHEREAS, California's and America's diversity is one of our
5 greatest strengths; and
6 WHEREAS, To achieve a more just and fair society, we must
7 teach our children to respect one another, to appreciate our
8 differences, and to recognize the common good in all of us; and
9 WHEREAS, Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people
10 come from all walks of life, regardless of race, ethnicity, color,
11 religion, ancestry, national origin, economic status, physical or
12 mental ability, medical condition, sex, or gender identity or
13 expression; and
14 WHEREAS, More lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people
15 are being elected to public offices across the country, playing in
16 professional sports leagues, occupying the highest positions in
17 business and government, and serving as role models for all; and
18 WHEREAS, Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people
19 have made important and lasting contributions to our great state
20 and nation in every field of endeavor, including, but not limited
21 to, business, medicine, law, humanities, science, literature, politics,

1 education, music, philanthropy, sports and athletics, arts, and
2 culture, that enrich our national life; and

3 WHEREAS, For the first time in the history of the United States,
4 a sitting President and Vice President, President Barack Obama
5 and Vice President Joe Biden, affirmed their support for the
6 fundamental right to marry, regardless of sexual orientation or
7 gender; and

8 WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States struck
9 down a provision of the federal Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA),
10 which barred the federal government from recognizing same-sex
11 marriages, affirming that all loving and committed couples who
12 are married deserve equal treatment and respect; and

13 WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States ruled that
14 Proposition 8 sponsors had no standing to appeal the federal trial
15 court's decision that Proposition 8 is unconstitutional, thereby
16 restoring marriage equality in California; and

17 WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States has found
18 a constitutional basis for marriage equality, granting millions of
19 lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender individuals across the
20 country the ability to marry people whom they love; and

21 WHEREAS, A growing number of married same-sex couples
22 now enjoy the same rights and privileges granted to other married
23 couples, including joint tax filings, military benefits, family and
24 medical leave, and the ability to sponsor their foreign spouse; and

25 WHEREAS, The transgender community in particular, has
26 gained newfound prominence in the media, entertainment, sports,
27 and business, raising awareness about gender identity and the
28 obstacles this community continues to face; and

29 WHEREAS, While our great state and nation have progressed
30 in our journey toward dignity, understanding, and mutual respect
31 for all, we still have a long way to go in eradicating the prejudice
32 and discrimination that lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender
33 people and their families encounter, and to this end, we continue
34 working for the passage of the inclusive federal Employment
35 Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA), comprehensive immigration
36 reform, and increased awareness of the difficulties facing the
37 transgender community; and

38 WHEREAS, Friends and allies of the LGBT community have
39 shown considerable support and commitment to the struggles of

1 lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people at home and abroad;
2 and

3 WHEREAS, To build a stronger and better state and nation, we
4 must continue to help advance the cause of equality for all people;
5 and

6 WHEREAS, Each year, June marks the anniversary of the
7 Stonewall Rebellion that gave birth to the modern lesbian, gay,
8 bisexual, and transgender civil rights movement; and

9 WHEREAS, President Barack Obama has proclaimed June as
10 Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Pride Month and
11 reaffirmed his administration's goal of eliminating prejudice
12 everywhere it exists and celebrating the great diversity of the
13 American people; and

14 WHEREAS, Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender Americans,
15 their families and friends, and all those committed to justice and
16 equality celebrate, during the month of June, the rich culture, the
17 notable achievements, and the outstanding services that lesbian,
18 gay, bisexual, and transgender Americans make to our great state
19 and nation; now, therefore, be it

- 2) Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people have made important and lasting contributions to our great state and nation in every field of endeavor including business, medicine, law, humanities, science, literature, politics, education, music, philanthropy, sports, arts and culture that enrich our national life.
- 3) Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender Americans, their family and friends, and all those committed to justice and equality celebrate during the month of June the rich culture, the notable achievements and outstanding services that lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender Americans make to our great state and nation.
- 4) For the first time in the history of the United States, a sitting President and Vice President, President Barack Obama and Vice President Joe Biden, affirmed their support for the fundamental right to marry, regardless of sexual orientation or gender; and, President Obama has proclaimed June 2016 as LGBT Pride Month and reaffirmed his administration's goal of eliminating prejudice everywhere it exists and to celebrate the great diversity of the American people.
