School Attendance

On page 1, before line 1, insert:

WHEREAS, The Legislature and the Governor enacted a local control funding formula and clearly established school attendance as a matter of great state interest by explicitly identifying pupil engagement, as measured by school attendance and chronic absenteeism rates, as a state priority; and

WHEREAS, The Legislature first enacted Senate Bill 1357 of the 2009–10 Regular Session to establish the definition of a "chronic absentee" as a pupil who misses 10 percent or more of school for any reason, making no distinction between excused and unexcused absences; and

WHEREAS, For the first time, every county office of education, school district, and charter school in California is required to calculate chronic absenteeism rates and establish specific goals and actions to improve pupil engagement; and

WHEREAS, The impact of chronic absenteeism hits low-income pupils and children of color particularly hard if they do not have the resources to make up for lost time in the classroom. Low-income pupils and children of color are more likely to face systemic barriers in getting to school, including unreliable transportation, lack of access to health care, unstable or unaffordable housing, and even unfair discipline policies; and

WHEREAS, Improving school climate, reducing instruction missed due to discipline policies and out-of-school suspensions, and implementing schoolwide positive behavior intervention and support systems and restorative justice practices can have a significant impact on improving attendance; and

WHEREAS, School attendance improves, and chronic absenteeism is significantly reduced, when schools, parents, and communities work together to monitor and promote good attendance and address hurdles that keep children from getting to school; and

WHEREAS, Schools and school districts must do more to track, calculate, and share data on how many and which pupils are chronically absent so that schools and communities can work to deliver the right interventions for the right pupils; and

WHEREAS, Superintendent of Public Instruction Tom Torlakson, Attorney General Kamala D. Harris, Secretary of California Health and Human Services Diane

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Dooley, Chief Justice Tani G. Cantil-Sakauye, and others have joined efforts to combat chronic absenteeism to encourage state and local action to improve the overall health, safety, and well-being of our children by promoting public awareness and reforms that improve school attendance; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate thereof concurring, That the Legislature designates the month of September 2014 as School Attendance Awareness Month in the State of California, and encourages public officials, educators, and communities in California to observe the month with appropriate activities and programs; and be it further

House Resolution No. 43—Relative to Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender (LGBT) Pride Month.

- WHEREAS, Our great state and nation consistently and 1 diligently strives to promote the egalitarian principles of equality 3 and justice where all people have inalienable rights, including life,
- liberty, and the pursuit of happiness; and
- WHEREAS, California's and America's diversity is one of our 5 6 greatest strengths; and
- WHEREAS, To achieve a just and fair society, we must teach our children to respect one another, to appreciate our differences, 9 and to recognize the common good in all of us; and
 - WHEREAS, Our great state protects its residents from discrimination and harassment based on actual or perceived race, ethnicity, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, physical or mental ability, medical condition, sex, including gender identity or expression, or sexual orientation; and
- 14 WHEREAS, Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people 15 have made important and lasting contributions to our great state 16
- and nation in every field of endeavor, including, but not limited 17
- 18 to, business, medicine, law, humanities, science, literature, politics,

1 education, music, philanthropy, sports and athletics, arts, and 2 culture, that enrich our national life; and

WHEREAS, Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people come from all walks of life, regardless of race, ethnicity, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, economic status, physical or mental ability, medical condition, sex, or gender identity or expression; and

WHEREAS, For the first time in the history of the United States, a sitting President and Vice President, President Barack Obama and Vice President Joe Biden, affirmed their support for the fundamental right to marry, regardless of sexual orientation or gender. Former Vice President Dick Cheney and former First Lady Laura Bush have also affirmed their support for marriage equality; and

WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States struck down the Defense of Marriage Act and Proposition 8, which barred the federal government from recognizing same-sex marriages and restored marriage equality to California, respectively; and

WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States struck down the federal Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA), affirming that all loving and committed couples who are married deserve equal treatment and respect from the federal government; and

WHEREAS, The Supreme Court of the United States ruled that Proposition 8 sponsors had no standing to appeal the federal trial court's decision that Proposition 8 is unconstitutional, thereby restoring marriage equality in California; and

WHEREAS, Married same-sex couples now enjoy the same rights and privileges granted to other married couples, including joint tax filings, military benefits, family and medical leave, and the ability to sponsor their foreign spouse; and

WHEREAS, The Department of Defense repealed "Don't Ask, Don't Tell," allowing servicemen and women to serve their country openly and proudly; and

WHEREAS, More lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people are being elected to public offices across the country, playing in professional sports leagues, occupying the highest positions in business, and serving as role models for all; and

WHEREAS, While our great state and nation have progressed in our journey toward dignity, understanding, and mutual respect for all, we still have a long way to go in eradicating the prejudice -3- HR 43

and discrimination that lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people and their families encounter, and to this end, we continue working for the passage of the inclusive federal Employment Non-Discrimination Act (ENDA), comprehensive immigration reform, and increased awareness of the difficulties facing the transgender community; and

WHEREAS, To build a stronger and better state and nation, we must continue to help advance the cause of equality for all people; and

WHEREAS, Friends and allies of the LGBT community have shown considerable support and commitment to the struggles of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people at home and abroad; and

WHEREAS, Each year, June marks the anniversary of the Stonewall Rebellion that gave birth to the modern lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender civil rights movement; and

WHEREAS, President Barack Obama has proclaimed June as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender Pride Month and reaffirmed his administration's goal of eliminating prejudice everywhere it exists and celebrating the great diversity of the American people; and

WHEREAS, Lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender Americans, their families and friends, and all those committed to justice and equality celebrate, during the month of June, the rich culture, the notable achievements, and the outstanding services that lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender Americans make to our great state and nation; now, therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, That the Assembly proclaims June 2014 as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgender (LGBT) Pride Month, urges all residents to join in celebrating the culture, accomplishments, and contributions of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people, and encourages the people of California to work to help advance the cause of equality for lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people and their families; and be it further

WHEREAS, An innovative strategy for protecting and enhancing the coast and managing conflicts between development and coastal resource protection has been in effect on a regional scale since 1965 in the San Francisco Bay area and for the entire California coast since 1972; and

WHEREAS, The National Coastal Zone Management Program was authorized by the federal Coastal Zone Management Act of 1972 (CZMA) (16 U.S.C. Section 1451 and following) to balance economic development with the need to preserve, protect, enhance, and restore the nation's coastal resources; and

WHEREAS, The CZMA promotes coordination between the federal government and the states by encouraging coastal states to prepare coastal management programs that guide both state and federal activities affecting the coast; and

WHEREAS, California's coastal management program is implemented by various entities within the Natural Resources Agency, including the San Francisco Bay Conservation and Development Commission, the California Coastal Commission, the California Ocean Science Trust, and the State Coastal Conservancy, working together and in partnership with the Ocean Protection Council, the Ocean Science Trust, the State Lands Commission, the Department of Fish and Wildlife, and other-state agencies public agencies and nonprofit organizations to carry out
