No. 3

Introduced by Assembly Members Choi and Quirk-Silva

December 3, 2018

Assembly Concurrent Resolution No. 3—Relative to Korean American Day.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL’S DIGEST

ACR 3, as introduced, Choi. Korean American Day.

This measure would proclaim January 13, 2019, as Korean American Day.

Fiscal committee: no.

1 WHEREAS, On January 13, 1903, the history of Korean
2 immigration to America began when 102 courageous Korean men,
3 women, and children landed in the State of Hawaii after venturing
4 across the vast Pacific Ocean aboard the S.S. Gaelic; and

5 WHEREAS, The hopes of these Korean immigrants for America,
6 the land of opportunity, were quickly hindered by social, economic,
7 and language barriers of unforeseen magnitude; and

8 WHEREAS, These Korean immigrants did not falter in their
9 pursuit of the American dream. Through perseverance and sacrifice,
10 they established a new home in a new land and educated their
11 children; and

12 WHEREAS, Between 1904 and 1907, approximately 1,000
13 Korean Americans entered the United States mainland from the
14 State of Hawaii through San Francisco, where the first Korean
15 American political organizations and Korean language publications
16 were established; and

1 WHEREAS, Many Korean Americans left San Francisco,
2 primarily to become farmworkers. Some Korean Americans
3 combined their money and resources to lease farmland near the
4 towns of Dinuba and Reedley in the San Joaquin Valley and in the
5 Sacramento Valley. Dozens of other Korean Americans served as
6 wage laborers for mining companies and as section hands on the
7 railroads in the States of Montana, Oregon, Utah, and Washington;
8 and

9 WHEREAS, The Japanese occupation of Korea prevented
10 further Korean immigration into the United States. However, many
11 Korean Americans desired to establish families in the United States,
12 despite the new limitations on immigration. As a result, a picture
13 bride system was established, which delivered approximately 1,000
14 new Korean immigrants to the State of Hawaii, and 100 more to
15 the Pacific Coast of the United States mainland, before 1924; and

16 WHEREAS, San Francisco remained the center of the Korean
17 American community during this period, but there was a gradual
18 migration of Korean Americans from San Francisco and the
19 surrounding rural areas to southern California. As more
20 employment opportunities opened up, a new, burgeoning
21 community of Korean Americans began to thrive in the Los
22 Angeles area; and

23 WHEREAS, While the first Korean immigrants to the United
24 States fought and sacrificed to establish themselves, their children
25 grew up to be patriotic citizens, many of whom went on to serve
26 in the Armed Forces of the United States during World War II and
27 to make other important contributions to mainstream American
28 society; and

29 WHEREAS, The 1965 amendments to the federal Immigration
30 and Nationality Act (Public Law 89-236) opened the door for a
31 new wave of Korean immigrants to enter the United States. Since
32 its enactment, Korean Americans have become one of the fastest
33 growing groups of Asian Americans in the United States. In 1960,
34 approximately 25,000 people of Korean ancestry lived in the United
35 States, but by 1970, that number had increased to 69,130. By 1980,
36 the number of people of Korean ancestry living in the United States
37 had increased over fivefold to 354,593, and, by 1990, that number
38 more than doubled, increasing to 798,849. In 2010, it was estimated
39 that 1,706,822 people with some Korean ancestry lived in the

1 United States, representing more than a 67-fold increase since
2 1960; and

3 WHEREAS, With diligence, fortitude, and an enduring belief
4 in the American dream, Korean immigrants have helped to turn
5 emergent areas within the State of California into thriving and
6 respectable communities, while raising their children to be
7 productive Korean Americans; and

8 WHEREAS, Korean Americans have become an integral part
9 of mainstream American society and have made important
10 contributions as Californians in the fields of finance, technology,
11 law, medicine, education, sports, media, the arts, the military, and
12 government, as well as other areas; and

13 WHEREAS, As the Korean American community prepares for
14 a new era and creates new history, Korean Americans must instill
15 in younger generations the proper appreciation for the courage and
16 values of their forefathers, a deep sense of their roots, and pride
17 in their own cultural heritage so that they may better contribute to
18 the great State of California, rich with ethnic and cultural diversity;
19 now, therefore, be it

20 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
21 *thereof concurring*, That the Legislature hereby proclaims January
22 13, 2019, as Korean American Day; and be it further

23 *Resolved*, That the Chief Clerk of the Assembly transmit copies
24 of this resolution to the author for appropriate distribution.

Jr. and commemorate Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.

1 WHEREAS, On Wednesday, January 15, 2019, Dr. Martin
2 Luther King, Jr. would have been 90 years of age; and
3 WHEREAS, On April 10, 1970, California became the first
4 state to pass legislation making Dr. King’s birthday a school
5 holiday and, subsequently, a statewide holiday; and
6 WHEREAS, Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement helped
7 change public policy from segregation to integration, resulting in
8 the repeal of the post-Reconstruction era state laws mandating
9 racial segregation in the South known as the “Jim Crow Laws,”
10 thereby leading to the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964,
11 now effective for 55 years, the Voting Rights Act of 1965, and
12 other antidiscrimination laws aimed at ending economic, legal,
13 and social segregation in America; and

1 WHEREAS, Dr. King, in the last months of his life, began
2 organizing a Poor People’s Campaign to, among other things,
3 assemble “a multiracial army of the poor that would descend on
4 Washington—engaging in nonviolent civil disobedience at the
5 Capitol, if need be—until Congress enacted a poor people’s bill
6 of rights,” and 2018 marked the 50th anniversary of this campaign;
7 and

8 WHEREAS, Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement helped
9 change public policy from legal and socially acceptable
10 discrimination and segregation to an open and accessible policy
11 of racial integration leading to equal participation in and access to
12 primary and higher education, housing, employment, transportation,
13 federal, state, and local governmental elections, and other aspects
14 of public policy relating to human rights; and

15 WHEREAS, The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. devoted
16 his life to fighting segregation and injustice by nonviolent means
17 and is an outstanding example of courageous leadership in the face
18 of unrelenting violence and harassment by individuals and
19 governmental institutions; and

20 WHEREAS, The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. is a
21 source of inspiration for all Americans; now, therefore, be it

22 *Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate*
23 *thereof concurring,* That the California Legislature recognizes the

- 4) Dr. King and the Civil Rights Movement helped change public policy to an open and accessible policy of racial integration leading to equal participation in and access to primary and higher education, housing, employment, transportation, federal, state, and local governmental elections, and other aspects of public policy relating to human rights.
- 5) The Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. is a source of inspiration for all Americans.

ISSUE:

WORKPLACE CONDUCT PANEL APPOINTMENT**

ISSUE: Appointment of Connie A. Broussard to the Workplace Conduct Panel within the Legislative Counsel’s new Workplace Conduct Unit.

BACKGROUND: In 2018, the Joint Committee on Rules adopted a set of recommendations and a new Policy on Appropriate Workplace Conduct. The policy establishes an independent “Workplace Conduct Unit” in the Legislative Counsel’s office, and provides for the creation of an independent panel to make factual findings and recommendations on complaints related to workplace conduct, including sexual harassment.
